Definitions of "Torture" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “torture” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A cause of great suffering or anxiety.*
- *The action or practice of inflicting severe pain or suffering on someone as a punishment or in order to force them to do or say something.*
- *Great physical or mental suffering or anxiety.*
- *The act of distorting something so it seems to mean something it was not intended to mean.*
- *Intense feelings of suffering; acute mental or physical pain.*
- *Extreme mental distress.*
- *The deliberate, systematic, or wanton infliction of physical or mental suffering by one*

or more persons in an attempt to force another person to yield information or to make a confession or for any other reason.

- *Unbearable physical pain.*

overrefinement	The act of distorting something so it seems to mean something it was not intended to mean.
pain	Mental suffering or distress. <i>The pain of loneliness.</i>
<u>straining</u>	Difficulty that causes worry or emotional tension- R.J.Samuelson.
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>His disregard for the sufferings of his fellow countrymen.</i>
torment	A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented. <i>The journey must have been a torment for them.</i>
torturing	Intense feelings of suffering; acute mental or physical pain. <i>It required unnatural torturing to extract a confession.</i>
<u>trial</u>	A test of individual ability on a motorcycle over rough ground or on a road. <i>The editor was summoned to stand trial for libel.</i>
twisting	A hairdo formed by braiding or twisting the hair. <i>It broke off after much twisting.</i>

Synonyms of "Torture" as a verb (13 Words)

afflict

(of a celestial body) be in a stressful aspect with (another celestial body or a point on the ecliptic.

*His younger child was **afflicted** with a skin disease.*

agonize

Cause to agonize.

*A question which will **agonize** the technocrats.*

cause agony to

Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

cause suffering to

Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

distress

Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship.

*The manner in which leather jackets are industrially **distressed**.*

excruciate	Torment (someone) physically or mentally. <i>I stand back excruciated by the possibility.</i>
harrow	Draw a harrow over land. <i>They ploughed and harrowed the heavy clay.</i>
inflict anguish on	Impose something unpleasant.
inflict pain on	Impose something unpleasant.
inflict suffering on	Impose something unpleasant.
plague	Cause continual trouble or distress to. <i>He has been plagued by ill health.</i>
rack	Go at a rack. <i>He was racked with guilt.</i>
torment	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>Every day I have kids tormenting me because they know I live alone.</i>



Usage Examples of "Torture" as a verb

- *His tortured mind.*
- *Most of the victims had been brutally tortured.*
- *He was tortured by grief.*



Associations of "Torture" (30 Words)

<u>anguish</u>	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <i>Philip gave a cry of anguish.</i>
atonement	The action of making amends for a wrong or injury. <i>He submitted his resignation as an act of atonement.</i>
confess	Confess to a punishable or reprehensible deed usually under pressure. <i>150 people confessed faith in Christ.</i>
<u>confession</u>	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>Proof of this crime must be established by confession.</i>
contrition	The state of feeling remorseful and penitent. <i>To show contrition for his crime he offered to do community service.</i> (with reference to a person) in a way that wilfully causes pain or suffering to others.
cruelly	<i>He marries Edgar's sister Isabella and cruelly ill treats her.</i>
distortion	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>The virus causes distortion of the leaves.</i>
extrajudicial	(of a sentence) not legally authorized. <i>An extrajudicial offer does not carry the same penalty in expenses.</i>
forgive	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I'll never forgive David for the way he treated her.</i>
guilty	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i>Guilty of murder.</i>
<u>misdeed</u>	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior. <i>His past misdeeds were forgiven.</i>
<u>mistreat</u>	Treat (a person or animal) badly, cruelly, or unfairly. <i>He denied mistreating his workers.</i>
penance	Impose a penance on. <i>The Bishop penanced him severely for his conduct.</i>
penitence	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of penitence.</i>
penitent	(Roman Catholic Church) a person who repents for wrongdoing (a Roman Catholic may be admitted to penance under the direction of a confessor). <i>A penitent expression.</i>
penitential	Relating to or expressing penitence or penance. <i>Penitential tears.</i>

regret	Express with regret. <i>I regret to say that you did not gain admission to Harvard.</i>
relentlessly	In an unceasingly intense or harsh way. <i>He worked relentlessly.</i>
remorse	Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with remorse and shame.</i>
remorseful	Filled with remorse; sorry. <i>The defendant was remorseful for what he had done.</i>
repent	Feel remorse for; feel sorry for; be contrite about. <i>Marian came to repent her hasty judgement.</i>
repentance	The action of repenting; sincere regret or remorse. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine repentance and faith will be saved.</i>
repentant	Feeling or expressing remorse for misdeeds. <i>He is truly repentant for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
rue	Leaves sometimes used for flavoring fruit or claret cup but should be used with great caution: can cause irritation like poison ivy. <i>To his rue the error cost him the game.</i>
ruthlessly	In a ruthless manner. <i>They fell prey to money lenders who ruthlessly exploited them.</i>
sadistic	Deriving pleasure from inflicting pain, suffering, or humiliation on others. <i>A sadistic killer.</i>
sin	Commit a sin violate a law of God or a moral law. <i>I sinned and brought shame down on us.</i>
sinner	A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts. <i>God forgives repentant sinners.</i>
torment	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>So great was his harassment that he wanted to destroy his tormentors.</i>
trial	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>A trial of progesterone failed to relieve the pain.</i>
