Synonyms of "Totality" as a noun (16 Words)

aggregate	Pieces of broken or crushed stone or gravel used to make concrete and in building. <i>The council was an aggregate of three regional assemblies.</i>
alpha and omega	The first and last; signifies God's eternity.
be-all and end-all	The essential factor; the all-important element; the supreme aim.
beginning and end	The act of starting something.
completeness	The state of being complete and entire; having everything that is needed. <i>For the sake of completeness a brief update is included here.</i>
entireness	The state of being total and complete.
entirety	The state of being total and complete. <i>He read the article in its entirety.</i>

fullness	The condition of being filled to capacity. <i>The honesty and fullness of the information they provide.</i>
inclusiveness	The practice or policy of providing equal access to opportunities and resources for people who might otherwise be excluded or marginalized, such as those having physical or mental disabilities or belonging to other minority groups. <i>The most useful feature of the book is probably its inclusiveness.</i>
integrality	The state of being total and complete.
<u>sum</u>	The final aggregate. <i>The sum of all our troubles did not equal the misery they suffered.</i>
sum total	A set containing all and only the members of two or more given sets.
<u>total</u>	The whole amount. <i>He scored a total of thirty three points.</i>
<u>unity</u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>They speak of the three parts as a unity.</i>
<u>whole</u>	An assemblage of parts that is regarded as a single entity. <i>The effects will last for the whole of his life.</i>
wholeness	Good physical or mental health. <i>The work lacked a sense of wholeness and meaning.</i>

- *Appalled by the totality of the destruction.*
