- *A person soliciting custom or business, typically in a direct or persistent manner.*
- *An informer.*
- *A person who buys up tickets for an event to resell them at a profit.*
- *Someone who buys tickets to an event in order to resell them at a profit.*
- *Someone who advertises for customers in an especially brazen way.*

- *Advertize in strongly positive terms.*
- *Show off.*
- *Spy out the movements and condition of (a racehorse in training) in order to gain information to be used when betting.*
- *Attempt to persuade people of the merits of.*
- *Offer racing tips for a share of any resulting winnings.*
- *Attempt to sell (something), typically by a direct or persistent approach.*

### Synonyms of "Tout" as a verb (24 Words)

- blow** Be blowing or storming.  
*A man whose cover was **blown**.*
- bluster** Show off.  
*You threaten and **bluster** but won t carry it through.*
- boast** (of a person, place, or thing) possess (a feature that is a source of pride).  
*He **boasted** that he had taken part in the crime.*
- brag** Show off.  
*They were **bragging** about how easy it had been.*
- commend** Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend.  
*His paintings **commend** him to the artistic world.*
- endorse** Be behind; approve of.  
*The speed and accuracy achieved will be **endorsed** on the certificate.*



<b>gas</b>	Attack with gas subject to gas fumes. <i>I thought you d never stop <b>gassing</b>.</i>
<b>gasconade</b>	Show off.
<b>hawk</b>	Of a person hunt game with a trained hawk. <i>The tribes like to <b>hawk</b> in the desert.</i>
<b>market</b>	Deal in a market. <i>We go <b>marketing</b> every Saturday.</i>
<b>offer for sale</b>	Make available; provide.
<b>peddle</b>	Sell or offer for sale from place to place. <i>He was arrested after trying to <b>peddle</b> guns.</i>
<b>praise</b>	Express one's respect and gratitude towards (a deity), especially in song. <i>The parents <b>praised</b> their children for their academic performance.</i>
<b>push</b>	Make strenuous pushing movements during birth to expel the baby. <i>I was <b>pushing</b> hard until about 10 laps from the finish.</i>
<b>recommend</b>	Advise or suggest (something) as a course of action. <i>The travel agent <b>recommended</b> strongly that we not travel on Thanksgiving Day.</i>
<b>sell</b>	Sell all of one s property possessions or assets. <i>The brothers <b>sell</b> shoes.</i>
<b>shoot a line</b>	Throw dice, as in a crap game.
<b>speak of</b>	Use language.
<b>support</b>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>Olivier <b>supported</b> Gielgud beautifully in the second act.</i>
<b>swash</b>	(of water or an object in water) move with a splashing sound. <i>The water <b>swashed</b> and rippled around the car wheels.</i>
<b>talk of</b>	Deliver a lecture or talk.
<b>urge</b>	Encourage (a person or animal) to move more quickly or in a particular direction. <i>I <b>urged</b> him to finish his studies.</i>
<b>vaunt</b>	Show off. <i>He was initially <b>vaunted</b> by the West for his leadership of the country.</i>
<b>vend</b>	Offer (small items) for sale, either from a stall or from a slot machine. <i>There was a man <b>vending</b> sticky cakes and ices.</i>

- *Shop managers would stand in the street touting for business.*
- *She was touted as a potential Prime Minister.*
- *He made his fortune touting tickets.*
- *Sanjay was touting his wares.*

<b>acclaim</b>	Praise vociferously. <i>The conference was <b>acclaimed</b> as a considerable success.</i>
<b>acclamation</b>	Enthusiastic approval. <i>The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in <b>acclamation</b>.</i>
<b>admire</b>	Look at (something impressive or attractive) with pleasure. <i>I <b>admire</b> your courage.</i>
<b>adulatory</b>	Excessively praising or admiring. <i>The tone here is <b>adulatory</b> and uncritical.</i>
<b>advantage</b>	Give an advantage to. <i>She had an <b>advantage</b> over her mother s generation.</i>
<b>applaud</b>	Express approval of. <i>His speech was loudly <b>applauded</b>.</i>
<b>ballyhoo</b>	Blatant or sensational promotion. <i>After all the <b>ballyhoo</b> the film was a flop.</i>
<b>cajolery</b>	Coaxing or flattery intended to persuade someone to do something. <i>She uses <b>cajolery</b> deception and manipulation to get what she wants.</i>
<b>commend</b>	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i><b>Commend</b> me to my son and bid him rule better than I.</i>
<b>commendable</b>	In an admirable manner. <i>A <b>commendable</b> sense of purpose.</i>
<b>commendation</b>	An official award (as for bravery or service) usually given as formal public statement. <i>The film deserved the highest <b>commendation</b>.</i>
<b>compliment</b>	Congratulations or praise expressed to someone. <i>My <b>compliments</b> on your cooking.</i>
<b>creditable</b>	Worthy of often limited commendation. <i>A very <b>creditable</b> 2 4 defeat.</i>
<b>deify</b>	Exalt to the position of a God. <i>These young men <b>deify</b> financial success.</i>
<b>eulogistic</b>	Formally expressing praise.

<b>exalt</b>	Make noble in character; dignify. <i>Romanticism liberated the imagination and <b>exalted</b> the emotions.</i>
<b>extol</b>	Praise enthusiastically. <i><b>Extol</b> the virtues of one's children.</i>
<b>flatter</b>	Praise somewhat dishonestly. <i>Don't <b>flatter</b> yourself I wasn't doing it for your benefit.</i>
<b>glory</b>	An indication of radiant light drawn around the head of a saint. <i>Images of Christ in <b>glory</b>.</i>
<b>glowing</b>	Expressing great praise. <i>He received a <b>glowing</b> report from his teachers.</i>
<b>hype</b>	A deception carried out for the sake of publicity. <i>Is his comeback a <b>hype</b>.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>All glory <b>laud</b> and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	Worthy of high praise. <i><b>Laudable</b> motives of improving housing conditions.</i>
<b>laudatory</b>	(of speech or writing) expressing praise and commendation. <i>Enthusiastic and <b>laudatory</b> articles.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	A public speech or published text in praise of someone or something. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>praise</b>	The expression of respect and gratitude as an act of worship. <i>They sang a hymn of <b>praise</b> to God.</i>
<b>praiseworthy</b>	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>A significant and <b>praiseworthy</b> increase in computer intelligence.</i>
<b>venerate</b>	Regard with feelings of respect and reverence; consider hallowed or exalted or be in awe of. <i>Philip of Beverley was <b>venerated</b> as a saint.</i>
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A <b>worthy</b> fellow.</i>
