- *A major passage in the body, large bundle of nerve fibres, or other continuous elongated anatomical structure or region.*

parcel of land	A wrapped container.
<u>patch</u>	A small piece of code inserted into a program to improve its functioning or to correct a fault. <i>Patches of thin ice.</i>
<u>pathway</u>	A route, formed by a chain of nerve cells, along which impulses of a particular kind usually travel. <i>The crags and cornices of the mountainous pathways.</i>
piece of ground	A period of indeterminate length (usually short) marked by some action or condition.
piece of land	An artistic or literary composition.
<u>plot</u>	A chart or map showing the movements or progress of an object. <i>They concocted a plot to discredit the governor.</i>
<u>portion</u>	A part of something divided between two or more people; a share. <i>Burger joints offering huge portions.</i>
quarter	A quarter of a hundredweight 25 pounds. <i>Unemployment fell during the last quarter.</i>
<u>region</u>	The approximate amount of something usually used prepositionally as in in the region of. <i>The equatorial regions.</i>

<u>section</u>	The area created by a plane cutting through a solid. <i>I unscrewed every section of copper pipe from the roof tank to the hot water cylinder.</i>
<u>sector</u>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>The public sector.</i>
<u>span</u>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>The job was finished in the span of an hour.</i>
stretch	A stretch limo. <i>Beyond any stretch of his understanding.</i>
swathe	An enveloping bandage. <i>If the day is windy the swathes should be high and narrow.</i>
sweep	An act of sweeping something with a brush. <i>A grandiose sweep of his hand.</i>
zone	Any encircling or beltlike structure. <i>A pedestrian zone.</i>

afferent	An afferent nerve fibre or vessel. <i>Afferent</i> nerves.
<u>aisle</u>	A passage between cabinets and shelves of goods in a supermarket or other building. <i>I spend much of my time at the shops wandering through the aisles.</i>
axon	The long threadlike part of a nerve cell along which impulses are conducted from the cell body to other cells.

bottleneck	The style of playing that uses a bottleneck. <i>Animated films are still stymied by a technological bottleneck.</i>
cerebellum	A major division of the vertebrate brain; situated above the medulla oblongata and beneath the cerebrum in humans.
cerebrum	Anterior portion of the brain consisting of two hemispheres; dominant part of the brain in humans.
corridor	An enclosed passageway; rooms usually open onto it. <i>His room lay at the very end of the corridor.</i>
cortex	The layer of unmyelinated neurons the grey matter forming the cortex of the cerebrum.
cortical	Relating to or forming an outer layer of tissue immediately below the epidermis of a stem or root. <i>The outline of the kidney is irregular due to cortical scarring.</i>
elasticity	The tendency of a body to return to its original shape after it has been stretched or compressed. <i>The price elasticity of electricity demand.</i>
esophagus	The passage between the pharynx and the stomach.
furrow	Cut a furrow into a columns. <i>Gorges furrowing the deep sea floor.</i>
gangway	A movable bridge linking a ship to the shore.
lane	Each of a number of notional parallel strips in the gel of an electrophoresis plate, occupied by a single sample. <i>The innermost dust lane is dense enough to absorb some infrared.</i>
metabolic	Undergoing metamorphosis. <i>A metabolic disorder.</i>
nerve	Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body. <i>She nerved herself to enter the room.</i>
network	Connect as or operate with a network. <i>A railroad network.</i>
neural	Of or relating to the nervous system. <i>Patterns of neural activity.</i>
neurobiologist	A specialist in neurobiology.
neuron	A specialized cell transmitting nerve impulses; a nerve cell.
neuroscientist	An expert in neuroscience. <i>There is a significant and growing need among neuroscientists to exchange experimental data.</i>

olfactory	Relating to the sense of smell. <i>The olfactory organs.</i>
parietal	Of the parietal lobe. <i>Parietal rules.</i>
passage	Subject a strain of microorganisms or cells to a passage. <i>The passage of air from the lungs.</i>
path	A way or track laid down for walking or made by continual treading. <i>The missile traced a fiery path in the sky.</i>
pathway	A route, formed by a chain of nerve cells, along which impulses of a particular kind usually travel. <i>Research has indisputably been part of the pathway to progress.</i>
plasticity	The quality of being easily shaped or moulded. <i>Fine clay at the right degree of plasticity is more useful.</i>
route	Send via a specific route. <i>All lines of communication were routed through London.</i>
synapse	A junction between two nerve cells, consisting of a minute gap across which impulses pass by diffusion of a neurotransmitter. <i>Nerve impulses cross a synapse through the action of neurotransmitters.</i>
tube	A thing in the form of or resembling a tube. <i>Women with blocked tubes.</i>
