<a href="#"><u>patch</u></a>	A small piece of code inserted into a program to improve its functioning or to correct a fault. <i><b>Patches</b> of thin ice.</i>
<a href="#"><u>pathway</u></a>	A route, formed by a chain of nerve cells, along which impulses of a particular kind usually travel. <i>The crags and cornices of the mountainous <b>pathways</b>.</i>
<b>piece of ground</b>	A period of indeterminate length (usually short) marked by some action or condition.
<b>piece of land</b>	An artistic or literary composition.
<a href="#"><u>plot</u></a>	A chart or map showing the movements or progress of an object. <i>They concocted a <b>plot</b> to discredit the governor.</i>
<a href="#"><u>portion</u></a>	A part of something divided between two or more people; a share. <i>Burger joints offering huge <b>portions</b>.</i>
<b>quarter</b>	A quarter of a hundredweight 25 pounds. <i>Unemployment fell during the last <b>quarter</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>region</u></a>	The approximate amount of something usually used prepositionally as in in the region of. <i>The equatorial <b>regions</b>.</i>

<b><u>section</u></b>	The area created by a plane cutting through a solid. <i>I unscrewed every <b>section</b> of copper pipe from the roof tank to the hot water cylinder.</i>
<b><u>sector</u></b>	The minimum track length that can be assigned to store information unless otherwise specified a sector of data consists of 512 bytes. <i>The public <b>sector</b>.</i>
<b><u>span</u></b>	The wingspan of an aircraft or a bird. <i>The job was finished in the <b>span</b> of an hour.</i>
<b>stretch</b>	A stretch limo. <i>Beyond any <b>stretch</b> of his understanding.</i>
<b>swathe</b>	An enveloping bandage. <i>If the day is windy the <b>swathes</b> should be high and narrow.</i>
<b>sweep</b>	An act of sweeping something with a brush. <i>A grandiose <b>sweep</b> of his hand.</i>
<b>zone</b>	Any encircling or beltlike structure. <i>A pedestrian <b>zone</b>.</i>

<b>bottleneck</b>	The style of playing that uses a bottleneck. <i>Animated films are still stymied by a technological <b>bottleneck</b>.</i>
<b>cerebellum</b>	A major division of the vertebrate brain; situated above the medulla oblongata and beneath the cerebrum in humans.
<b>cerebrum</b>	Anterior portion of the brain consisting of two hemispheres; dominant part of the brain in humans.
<b>corridor</b>	An enclosed passageway; rooms usually open onto it. <i>His room lay at the very end of the <b>corridor</b>.</i>
<b>cortex</b>	The layer of unmyelinated neurons the grey matter forming the cortex of the cerebrum.
<b>cortical</b>	Relating to or forming an outer layer of tissue immediately below the epidermis of a stem or root. <i>The outline of the kidney is irregular due to <b>cortical</b> scarring.</i>
<b>elasticity</b>	The tendency of a body to return to its original shape after it has been stretched or compressed. <i>The price <b>elasticity</b> of electricity demand.</i>
<b>esophagus</b>	The passage between the pharynx and the stomach.
<b>furrow</b>	Cut a furrow into a columns. <i>Gorges <b>furrowing</b> the deep sea floor.</i>
<b>gangway</b>	A movable bridge linking a ship to the shore.
<b>lane</b>	Each of a number of notional parallel strips in the gel of an electrophoresis plate, occupied by a single sample. <i>The innermost dust <b>lane</b> is dense enough to absorb some infrared.</i>
<b>metabolic</b>	Undergoing metamorphosis. <i>A <b>metabolic</b> disorder.</i>
<b>nerve</b>	Any bundle of nerve fibers running to various organs and tissues of the body. <i>She <b>nerved</b> herself to enter the room.</i>
<b>network</b>	Connect as or operate with a network. <i>A railroad <b>network</b>.</i>
<b>neural</b>	Of or relating to the nervous system. <i>Patterns of <b>neural</b> activity.</i>
<b>neurobiologist</b>	A specialist in neurobiology.
<b>neuron</b>	A specialized cell transmitting nerve impulses; a nerve cell.
<b>neuroscientist</b>	An expert in neuroscience. <i>There is a significant and growing need among <b>neuroscientists</b> to exchange experimental data.</i>

<b>olfactory</b>	Relating to the sense of smell. <i>The <b>olfactory</b> organs.</i>
<b>parietal</b>	Of the parietal lobe. <i><b>Parietal</b> rules.</i>
<b>passage</b>	Subject a strain of microorganisms or cells to a passage. <i>The <b>passage</b> of air from the lungs.</i>
<b>path</b>	A way or track laid down for walking or made by continual treading. <i>The missile traced a fiery <b>path</b> in the sky.</i>
<b>pathway</b>	A route, formed by a chain of nerve cells, along which impulses of a particular kind usually travel. <i>Research has indisputably been part of the <b>pathway</b> to progress.</i>
<b>plasticity</b>	The quality of being easily shaped or moulded. <i>Fine clay at the right degree of <b>plasticity</b> is more useful.</i>
<b>route</b>	Send via a specific route. <i>All lines of communication were <b>routed</b> through London.</i>
<b>synapse</b>	A junction between two nerve cells, consisting of a minute gap across which impulses pass by diffusion of a neurotransmitter. <i>Nerve impulses cross a <b>synapse</b> through the action of neurotransmitters.</i>
<b>tube</b>	A thing in the form of or resembling a tube. <i>Women with blocked <b>tubes</b>.</i>
