- cultural** Of or relating to the shared knowledge and values of a society.
*The **cultural** diversity of British society.*

culture	A refined understanding or appreciation of culture. <i>This variety of lettuce is popular for its ease of culture.</i>
custom	Regular dealings with a shop or business by customers. <i>I have given this tailor my custom for many years.</i>
customary	In accordance with convention or custom. <i>I put the kettle on for our customary cup of coffee.</i>
diehard	A person who strongly opposes change or who continues to support something in spite of opposition. <i>A diehard Yankees fan.</i>
<u>ethnicity</u>	An ethnic quality or affiliation resulting from racial or cultural ties. <i>Ethnicity has a strong influence on community status relations.</i>
ethnology	The branch of anthropology that deals with the division of humankind into races and with their origins and distribution and distinctive characteristics.
<u>ethos</u>	The distinctive spirit of a culture or an era. <i>A challenge to the ethos of the 1960s.</i>
exoteric	Intended for or likely to be understood by the general public. <i>Writings of an exoteric nature.</i>
folklore	The traditional beliefs, customs, and stories of a community, passed through the generations by word of mouth. <i>Hollywood folklore.</i>
hyperborean	One of a people that the ancient Greeks believed lived in a warm and sunny land north of the source of the north wind.
immemorial	Long past; beyond the limits of memory or tradition or recorded history. <i>Time immemorial.</i>
<u>milieu</u>	A person's social environment. <i>Gregory came from the same aristocratic milieu as Sidonius.</i>
miscegenation	The interbreeding of people considered to be of different racial types. <i>They believe in miscegenation as the answer to world peace.</i>
mores	(sociology) the conventions that embody the fundamental values of a group. <i>An offence against social mores.</i>
morris	United States suffragist in Wyoming (1814-1902).
orthodox	Relating to the Orthodox Church. <i>Orthodox medical treatment.</i>
<u>outdated</u>	Old; no longer valid or fashionable. <i>Outdated equipment.</i>

- philistine** Hostile or indifferent to culture and the arts.
*I am a complete **philistine** when it comes to paintings.*
- primeval** Of the earliest time in history.
*Mile after mile of **primeval** forest.*
- relic** A part of a deceased holy person's body or belongings kept as an object of reverence.
*A museum of railway **relics**.*
- renaissance** The period of European history at the close of the Middle Ages and the rise of the modern world; a cultural rebirth from the 14th through the middle of the 17th centuries.
- stodgy** Out of fashion; old fashioned.
*He loves **stodgy** puddings.*
- stuffy** Affected with a sensation of stoppage or obstruction.
*Hot and **stuffy** and the air was blue with smoke.*
- traditional** Pertaining to time-honored orthodox doctrines.
*The simple security of **traditional** assumptions has vanished.*
