- conservative** Relating to the Conservative Party in the UK or a similar party elsewhere.  
*The film was not cheap 30 000 is a **conservative** estimate.*
- convention** Orthodoxy as a consequence of being conventional.  
*The **convention** signed by the six states bordering on the Black Sea aims to prevent further pollution.*
- cultural** Of or relating to the shared knowledge and values of a society.  
*The **cultural** diversity of British society.*

<b>culture</b>	A refined understanding or appreciation of culture. <i>This variety of lettuce is popular for its ease of <b>culture</b>.</i>
<b>custom</b>	Regular dealings with a shop or business by customers. <i>I have given this tailor my <b>custom</b> for many years.</i>
<b>customary</b>	In accordance with convention or custom. <i>I put the kettle on for our <b>customary</b> cup of coffee.</i>
<b>diehard</b>	A person who strongly opposes change or who continues to support something in spite of opposition. <i>A <b>diehard</b> Yankees fan.</i>
<b>ethnicity</b>	An ethnic quality or affiliation resulting from racial or cultural ties. <i><b>Ethnicity</b> has a strong influence on community status relations.</i>
<b>ethnology</b>	The branch of anthropology that deals with the division of humankind into races and with their origins and distribution and distinctive characteristics.
<b>ethos</b>	The distinctive spirit of a culture or an era. <i>A challenge to the <b>ethos</b> of the 1960s.</i>
<b>exoteric</b>	Intended for or likely to be understood by the general public. <i>Writings of an <b>exoteric</b> nature.</i>
<b>folklore</b>	The traditional beliefs, customs, and stories of a community, passed through the generations by word of mouth. <i>Hollywood <b>folklore</b>.</i>
<b>hyperborean</b>	One of a people that the ancient Greeks believed lived in a warm and sunny land north of the source of the north wind.
<b>immemorial</b>	Long past; beyond the limits of memory or tradition or recorded history. <i>Time <b>immemorial</b>.</i>
<b>milieu</b>	A person's social environment. <i>Gregory came from the same aristocratic <b>milieu</b> as Sidonius.</i>
<b>miscegenation</b>	The interbreeding of people considered to be of different racial types. <i>They believe in <b>miscegenation</b> as the answer to world peace.</i>
<b>mores</b>	(sociology) the conventions that embody the fundamental values of a group. <i>An offence against social <b>mores</b>.</i>
<b>morris</b>	United States suffragist in Wyoming (1814-1902).
<b>orthodox</b>	Relating to the Orthodox Church. <i><b>Orthodox</b> medical treatment.</i>
<b>outdated</b>	Old; no longer valid or fashionable. <i><b>Outdated</b> equipment.</i>



- philistine** Hostile or indifferent to culture and the arts.  
*I am a complete **philistine** when it comes to paintings.*
- primeval** Of the earliest time in history.  
*Mile after mile of **primeval** forest.*
- relic** A part of a deceased holy person's body or belongings kept as an object of reverence.  
*A museum of railway **relics**.*
- renaissance** The period of European history at the close of the Middle Ages and the rise of the modern world; a cultural rebirth from the 14th through the middle of the 17th centuries.
- stodgy** Out of fashion; old fashioned.  
*He loves **stodgy** puddings.*
- stuffy** Affected with a sensation of stoppage or obstruction.  
*Hot and **stuffy** and the air was blue with smoke.*
- traditional** Pertaining to time-honored orthodox doctrines.  
*The simple security of **traditional** assumptions has vanished.*
