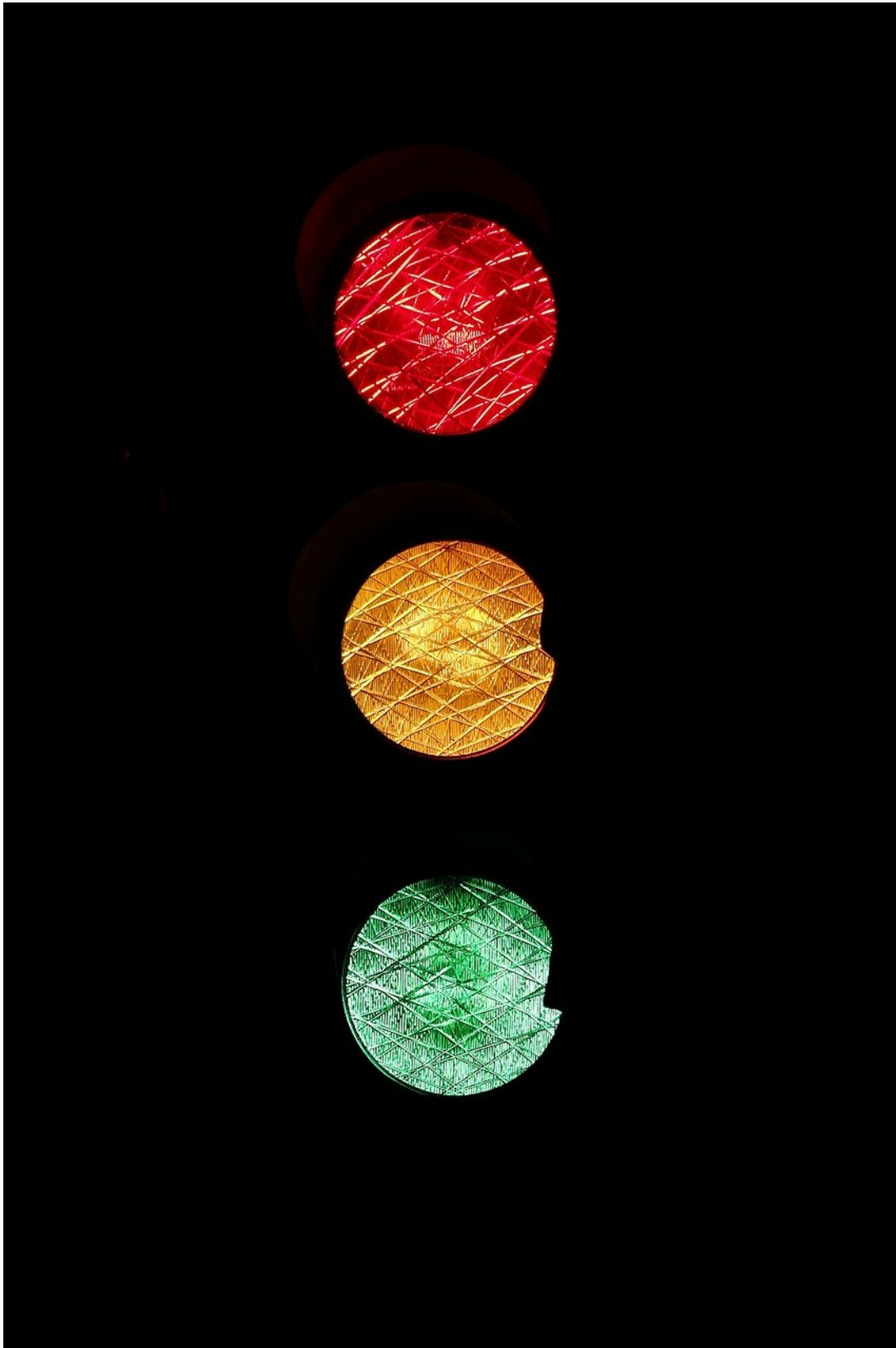
Traffic as a Noun

<u>commerce</u>	Sexual intercourse. <i>The changes in taxation are of benefit to commerce.</i>
communication	The imparting or exchanging of information by speaking, writing, or using some other medium. <i>At the moment I am in communication with London.</i>
connection	An association of Methodist Churches. <i>Ensure that all connections between the wires are properly made.</i>

dealings	Mutual dealings or connections or communications among persons or groups. <i>He has always been honest in his dealings with me.</i>
freight	A freight train. <i>I can hear the regular wail of the twelve o'clock freight from my house.</i>
movement of goods	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object.
movement of people	A major self-contained part of a symphony or sonata.
peddling	The activity of selling an illegal drug or stolen item. <i>The peddling of fear is a lucrative business.</i>
relations	A person related by blood or marriage.
shipping	Ships considered collectively, especially those in a particular area or belonging to a particular country. <i>The shipping of his works abroad.</i>

trade	A trade wind. <i>As they say in the trade.</i>
trading	The action or activity of buying and selling goods and services. <i>Trading profits leapt.</i>
trafficking	The aggregation of things (pedestrians or vehicles) coming and going in a particular locality during a specified period of time.
transport	Something that serves as a means of transportation. <i>Air transport.</i>
transportation	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The sentence was one of transportation for life.</i>
trucks	A handcart that has a frame with two low wheels and a ledge at the bottom and handles at the top; used to move crates or other heavy objects.
vehicles	A conveyance that transports people or objects. <i>The play was just a vehicle to display her talents.</i>

- deal** Be concerned with.
*The government had been unable to **deal** with the economic crisis.*
- do business** Get (something) done.

peddle Sell (an illegal drug or stolen item).
*He **peddled** printing materials around the country.*

trade Engage in the trade of.
*The stock **traded** around 20 a share.*

Associations of "Traffic" (30 Words)

bazaar	A street of small shops (especially in Orient). <i>The church bazaar.</i>
beacon	A hill suitable for a beacon. <i>A chain of beacons carried the news.</i>
bottleneck	Become narrow like a bottleneck. <i>His laziness has bottlenecked our efforts to reform the system.</i>
bumper-to-bumper	A mechanical device consisting of bars at either end of a vehicle to absorb shock and prevent serious damage.
car	A railway carriage. <i>The first class cars.</i>
caravan	Travel in a caravan. <i>They spent a fishing holiday in a caravan.</i>

coach	Drive a coach. <i>Fly or coach to the shores of the Mediterranean.</i>
commuter	A person who travels some distance to work on a regular basis. <i>A fault on the line caused widespread delays for commuters.</i>
<u>congested</u>	Overfull as with blood. <i>The congested streets of the West End.</i>
congestion	Excessive crowding. <i>Traffic congestion.</i>
<u>crossover</u>	The appropriation of a new style (especially in popular music) by combining elements of different genres in order to appeal to a wider audience. <i>A jazz classical crossover album.</i>
<u>crowded</u>	Overfilled or compacted or concentrated. <i>A young mother s crowded days.</i>
derail	Cause (a train or tram) to leave its tracks accidentally. <i>The trams had a tendency to derail on sharp corners.</i>
<u>gear</u>	Design or adjust the gears in a machine to give a specified speed or power output. <i>Now the champions moved up a gear.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>I m in a jam.</i>
jammed	Filled to capacity. <i>A suitcase jammed with dirty clothes.</i>
nonporous	Not porous; especially not having vessels that appear as pores.
occlude	Cover (an eye) to prevent its use. <i>Occluded within these crystals are other molecules.</i>
oncoming	Due to happen soon. <i>The oncoming winter.</i>
overcrowd	Cause to crowd together too much. <i>Employees were assigned to make sure people didn t overcrowd the escalators.</i>
<u>packed</u>	Pressed together or compressed. <i>A packed theater.</i>
<u>pressed</u>	Flattened, shaped, or smoothed by the application of pressure, typically from an iron. <i>Pressed flowers.</i>

slow	At a slow tempo. <i>Please go slow so I can see the sights.</i>
subway	An underground tunnel or passage enabling pedestrians to cross a road or railway. <i>In Paris the subway system is called the metro and in London it is called the tube or the underground.</i>
<u>teeming</u>	Abundantly filled with especially living things. <i>The Third World s teeming millions.</i>
<u>thick</u>	Not thin of a specific thickness or of relatively great extent from one surface to the opposite usually in the smallest of the three solid dimensions. <i>Thick crowds.</i>
thickly	(with reference to an accent) in a way that is very marked and difficult to understand. <i>Thickly sliced bread.</i>
throng	(of a crowd) fill or be present in (a place or area). <i>A throng of birds.</i>
<u>train</u>	Travel by rail or train. <i>Don t train your camera on the women.</i>
<u>vehicle</u>	A film, television programme, song, etc. that is intended to display the leading performer to the best advantage. <i>The play was just a vehicle to display her talents.</i>
