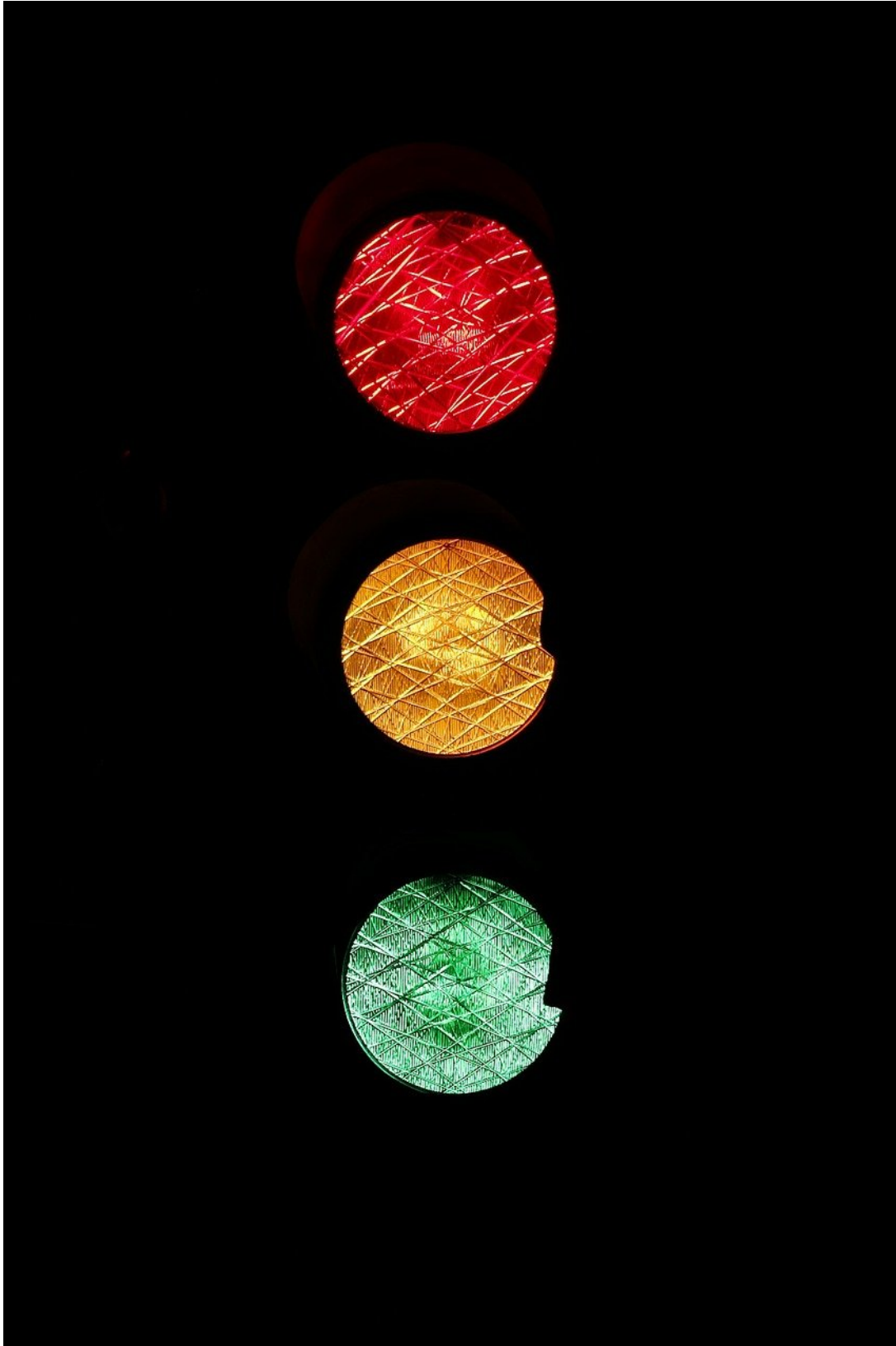
## Traffic as a Noun

<b>conveyancing</b>	The action of preparing documents for the conveyance of property.
<b>dealing</b>	The activity of buying and selling a particular commodity. <i>He has always been honest in his <b>dealings</b> with me.</i>
<b>dealings</b>	Mutual dealings or connections or communications among persons or groups. <i>He has always been honest in his <b>dealings</b> with me.</i>
<b>freight</b>	A freight train. <i>I can hear the regular wail of the twelve o'clock <b>freight</b> from my house.</i>
<b>movement of goods</b>	An optical illusion of motion produced by viewing a rapid succession of still pictures of a moving object.
<b>movement of people</b>	A major self-contained part of a symphony or sonata.
<b>peddling</b>	The activity of selling an illegal drug or stolen item. <i>The <b>peddling</b> of fear is a lucrative business.</i>
<b>relations</b>	A person related by blood or marriage.
<b>shipping</b>	Ships considered collectively, especially those in a particular area or belonging to a particular country. <i>The <b>shipping</b> of his works abroad.</i>

<b>trade</b>	A trade wind. <i>As they say in the <b>trade</b>.</i>
<b>trading</b>	The action or activity of buying and selling goods and services. <i><b>Trading</b> profits leapt.</i>
<b>trafficking</b>	The aggregation of things (pedestrians or vehicles) coming and going in a particular locality during a specified period of time.
<b>transport</b>	Something that serves as a means of transportation. <i>Air <b>transport</b>.</i>
<b>transportation</b>	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The sentence was one of <b>transportation</b> for life.</i>
<b>trucks</b>	A handcart that has a frame with two low wheels and a ledge at the bottom and handles at the top; used to move crates or other heavy objects.
<b>vehicles</b>	A conveyance that transports people or objects. <i>The play was just a vehicle to display her talents.</i>

<b>bazaar</b>	A street of small shops (especially in Orient). <i>The church <b>bazaar</b>.</i>
<b>beacon</b>	A hill suitable for a beacon. <i>A chain of <b>beacons</b> carried the news.</i>
<b>bottleneck</b>	Become narrow like a bottleneck. <i>His laziness has <b>bottlenecked</b> our efforts to reform the system.</i>
<b>bumper-to-bumper</b>	A mechanical device consisting of bars at either end of a vehicle to absorb shock and prevent serious damage.
<b>car</b>	A railway carriage. <i>The first class <b>cars</b>.</i>
<b>caravan</b>	Travel in a caravan. <i>They spent a fishing holiday in a <b>caravan</b>.</i>

<b>coach</b>	Drive a coach. <i>Fly or <b>coach</b> to the shores of the Mediterranean.</i>
<b>commuter</b>	A person who travels some distance to work on a regular basis. <i>A fault on the line caused widespread delays for <b>commuters</b>.</i>
<u>congested</u>	Overfull as with blood. <i>The <b>congested</b> streets of the West End.</i>
<b>congestion</b>	Excessive crowding. <i>Traffic <b>congestion</b>.</i>
<u>crossover</u>	The appropriation of a new style (especially in popular music) by combining elements of different genres in order to appeal to a wider audience. <i>A jazz classical <b>crossover</b> album.</i>
<u>crowded</u>	Overfilled or compacted or concentrated. <i>A young mother s <b>crowded</b> days.</i>
<b>derail</b>	Cause (a train or tram) to leave its tracks accidentally. <i>The trams had a tendency to <b>derail</b> on sharp corners.</i>
<u>gear</u>	Design or adjust the gears in a machine to give a specified speed or power output. <i>Now the champions moved up a <b>gear</b>.</i>
<u>jam</u>	A hold obtained by jamming a part of the body such as a hand or foot into a crack in the rock. <i>I m in a <b>jam</b>.</i>
<b>jammed</b>	Filled to capacity. <i>A suitcase <b>jammed</b> with dirty clothes.</i>
<b>nonporous</b>	Not porous; especially not having vessels that appear as pores.
<b>occlude</b>	Cover (an eye) to prevent its use. <i><b>Occluded</b> within these crystals are other molecules.</i>
<b>oncoming</b>	Due to happen soon. <i>The <b>oncoming</b> winter.</i>
<b>overcrowd</b>	Cause to crowd together too much. <i>Employees were assigned to make sure people didn t <b>overcrowd</b> the escalators.</i>
<u>packed</u>	Pressed together or compressed. <i>A <b>packed</b> theater.</i>
<u>pressed</u>	Flattened, shaped, or smoothed by the application of pressure, typically from an iron. <i><b>Pressed</b> flowers.</i>

<b>slow</b>	At a slow tempo. <i>Please go <b>slow</b> so I can see the sights.</i>
<b>subway</b>	An underground tunnel or passage enabling pedestrians to cross a road or railway. <i>In Paris the <b>subway</b> system is called the metro and in London it is called the tube or the underground.</i>
<b><u>teeming</u></b>	Abundantly filled with especially living things. <i>The Third World s <b>teeming</b> millions.</i>
<b><u>thick</u></b>	Not thin of a specific thickness or of relatively great extent from one surface to the opposite usually in the smallest of the three solid dimensions. <i><b>Thick</b> crowds.</i>
<b>thickly</b>	(with reference to an accent) in a way that is very marked and difficult to understand. <i><b>Thickly</b> sliced bread.</i>
<b>throng</b>	(of a crowd) fill or be present in (a place or area). <i>A <b>throng</b> of birds.</i>
<b><u>train</u></b>	Travel by rail or train. <i>Don t <b>train</b> your camera on the women.</i>
<b><u>vehicle</u></b>	A film, television programme, song, etc. that is intended to display the leading performer to the best advantage. <i>The play was just a <b>vehicle</b> to display her talents.</i>
