- An event resulting in great loss and misfortune.





# Synonyms of "Tragedies" as a noun (4 Words)

<u>calamity</u>	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. <i>Emergency measures may be necessary in order to avert a calamity</i> .
cataclysm	A large-scale and violent event in the natural world. The <b>cataclysm</b> at the end of the Cretaceous Period.
catastrophe	A sudden violent change in the earth's surface. Lack of funds has resulted in a <b>catastrophe</b> for our school system.
disaster	Denoting a genre of films that use natural or accidental catastrophe as the mainspring of plot and setting. 159 people died in the <b>disaster</b> .

adversity	A difficult or unpleasant situation. <i>Resilience in the face of <b>adversity</b>.</i>
<u>atrocious</u>	Provoking horror. An <b>atrocious</b> automobile accident.
befall	Happen, occur, or be the case in the course of events or by chance. <i>He promised that no harm would</i> <b>befall</b> <i>her.</i>
<u>beset</u>	Be covered or studded with. She was <b>beset</b> with self doubt.
betide	Happen to (someone. She was trembling with fear lest worse might <b>betide</b> her.
blow	Spout moist air from the blowhole. The double agent was <b>blow</b> n by the other side.



<u>calamity</u>	An event resulting in great loss and misfortune. The whole city was affected by the irremediable <b>calamity</b> .
cataclysm	A large-scale and violent event in the natural world. The <b>cataclysm</b> at the end of the Cretaceous Period.
catastrophe	Something very unfortunate or unsuccessful. Lack of funds has resulted in a <b>catastrophe</b> for our school system.
despondency	Low spirits from loss of hope or courage; dejection. An air of <b>despondency</b> .
disaster	A state of extreme (usually irremediable) ruin and misfortune. <b>Disaster</b> struck within minutes of take off.
distressed	(of furniture or clothing) having simulated marks of age and wear. <i>Women in <b>distressed</b> circumstances.</i>
<u>dreadful</u>	Used to emphasize the degree to which something is the case, especially something regarded with sadness or disapproval. <i>Don t go out the weather is <b>dreadful</b></i> .
<u>dystopia</u>	State in which the conditions of life are extremely bad as from deprivation or oppression or terror.
gloom	Make dark or dismal. <i>Gloom</i> pervaded the office.
<u>grief</u>	Intense sorrow caused by loss of a loved one (especially by death. <i>Time heals <b>grief</b>s and quarrels.</i>
heartache	Intense sorrow caused by loss of a loved one (especially by death. A good friend understands your <b>heartache</b> s as well as your joys.
horrible	Provoking horror. A <b>horrible</b> massacre.
<u>horrifying</u>	Provoking horror. A <b>horrifying</b> incident.
misadventure	An instance of misfortune. The coroner recorded a verdict of death by <b>misadventure</b> .
mischance	An unlucky occurrence. Innumerable <b>mischance</b> s might ruin the enterprise.
<u>misfortune</u>	An unfortunate state resulting from unfavorable outcomes. Never laugh at other people s <b>misfortune</b> s.
<u>mourn</u>	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. She <b>mourn</b> ed for her friends who died in the accident.
sadly	To a regrettable extent; regrettably. <b>Sadly</b> he died before he could see his grandchild.



sadness	The condition or quality of being sad. A source of great <b>sadness</b> .
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. A woman had cried all night <b>sorrow</b> ing over the death of her husband.
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>Suffering</i> refugees.
terrible	Causing fear or dread or terror. A <b>terrible</b> cough.
woe	Things that cause sorrow or distress; troubles. To add to his <b>woe</b> s customers have been spending less.
worst	Most wanting in quality or value or condition. At least 32 people died in Australia's <b>worst</b> hus accident
