deplorable	Of very poor quality or condition. <i>Deplorable housing conditions in the inner city.</i>
devastating	Physically or spiritually devastating often used in combination. <i>The news came as a devastating blow.</i>
dire	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>A dire emergency.</i>
disastrous	Having extremely unfortunate or dire consequences; bringing ruin. <i>A disastrous fire swept through the museum.</i>
distressing	Causing distress or worry or anxiety. <i>Some very distressing news.</i>
disturbing	Causing anxiety; worrying. <i>A disturbing amount of crime.</i>
dreadful	Causing or involving great suffering, fear, or unhappiness; extremely bad or serious. <i>You re a dreadful flirt.</i>
galling	Causing annoyance or resentment; annoying. <i>It would be galling to lose your job because of a dispute with a customer.</i>
grievous	Causing or marked by grief or anguish. <i>A grievous crime.</i>
gruesome	Causing repulsion or horror; grisly. <i>Gruesome catering.</i>
horrendous	Extremely unpleasant, horrifying, or terrible. <i>Horrendous explosions shook the city.</i>
lamentable	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Her open prejudice showed lamentable immaturity.</i>
miserable	Pitiably small or inadequate. <i>The company donated a miserable 100 for flood relief.</i>
moving	Used of a series of photographs presented so as to create the illusion of motion. <i>A constantly moving crowd.</i>
painful	Causing physical or psychological pain. <i>Her ankle was very painful.</i>
pathetic	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>His ball control was pathetic.</i>
piteous	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i>A piteous cry.</i>

<u>pitiful</u>	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>A pitiful attempt to impress her.</i>
regrettable	Deserving regret. <i>It s regrettable that she didn t go to college.</i>
ruinous	Causing injury or blight; especially affecting with sudden violence or plague or ruin. <i>A ruinous course of action.</i>
sad	Of things that make you feel sad. <i>A sad day for us all.</i>
<u>sorrowful</u>	Experiencing or marked by or expressing sorrow especially that associated with irreparable loss. <i>Sorrowful news.</i>
<u>stirring</u>	Exciting strong but not unpleasant emotions. <i>A stirring and thriving politician.</i>
terrible	Exceptionally bad or displeasing. <i>What a terrible mess.</i>
tragic	Very sad; especially involving grief or death or destruction.
<u>unfortunate</u>	Having or marked by bad fortune; unlucky. <i>The delay at the airport was an unfortunate start to our holiday.</i>
unhappy	Marked by or producing unhappiness. <i>Unhappy with her raise.</i>
<u>vexatious</u>	Denoting an action or the bringer of an action that is brought without sufficient grounds for winning, purely to cause annoyance to the defendant. <i>The vexatious questions posed by software copyrights.</i>
wretched	Very unhappy; full of misery. <i>A wretched life.</i>

<u>fatal</u>	Bringing death. <i>It is fatal to enter any war without the will to win it.</i>
grievous	Causing or marked by grief or anguish. <i>A grievous crime.</i>
hapless	Deserving or inciting pity- Galsworthy. <i>The hapless victims of the disaster.</i>
lamentable	(of an event, action, or attitude) unfortunate; regrettable. <i>The industry is in a lamentable state.</i>
<u>loser</u>	A gambler who loses a bet. <i>South appeared to have three losers a trump a diamond and a spade.</i>
mournful	Expressing sorrow. <i>Her large mournful eyes.</i>
<u>pathetic</u>	Inspiring scornful pity. <i>His ball control was pathetic.</i>
piteous	Deserving or inciting pity. <i>Piteous appeals for help.</i>
pitiable	Contemptibly poor or small. <i>Pitiable homeless children.</i>
<u>pitiful</u>	Inspiring mixed contempt and pity. <i>A pitiful attempt to impress her.</i>
<u>plaintive</u>	Sounding sad and mournful. <i>A plaintive cry.</i>
ruinous	In ruins; dilapidated. <i>A ruinous war.</i>
ruth	The great-grandmother of king David whose story is told in the Book of Ruth in the Old Testament.

sorrow An event or circumstance that causes sorrow.
*He drank to drown his **sorrows**.*

sorrowful Experiencing or marked by or expressing sorrow especially that associated with irreparable loss- Proverbs 14:13.
*She looked at him with **sorrowful** eyes.*

sorry In a poor or pitiful state.
*I m **sorry** you were saying.*

touching Arousing affect.
*His gratitude was simple and **touching**.*

unfortunate A person who suffers misfortune.
*An **unfortunate** speech.*
