

path	A way or track laid down for walking or made by continual treading. <i>The missile traced a fiery path in the sky.</i>
pathway	A bundle of myelinated nerve fibers following a path through the brain. <i>These neural pathways control vocalization.</i>
procession	The act of moving forward (as toward a goal). <i>Processions were forbidden.</i>
rank	The body of members of an organization or group. <i>They were drawn up outside their barracks in long ranks.</i>
road	The part of a road intended for vehicles especially in contrast to a verge or pavement. <i>A road accident.</i>
route	A round travelled in delivering, selling, or collecting goods. <i>Proposals have been put forward for a new route around the south of the town.</i>

row	The act of rowing as a sport. <i>They sat in the front row.</i>
scent	An odor left in passing by which a person or animal can be traced. <i>She sprayed scent over her body.</i>
sequence	A repetition of a phrase or melody at a higher or lower pitch. <i>A restless search for interesting harmonic sequences.</i>
series	(sports) several contests played successively by the same teams. <i>A series III SWB Land Rover.</i>
slipstream	The partial vacuum created in the wake of a moving vehicle, often used by other vehicles in a race to assist in overtaking. <i>When the US economy booms the rest of the world is pulled along in the slipstream.</i>
spoor	The track or scent of an animal. <i>The trail is marked by wolf spoor.</i>
stream	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>A perfect trout stream.</i>
string	Stringed instruments that are played with a bow. <i>A string of burglaries.</i>
succession	A group of strata representing a single chronological sequence. <i>The new king was already elderly at the time of his succession.</i>
tail	A thing resembling an animal's tail in its shape or position typically extending downwards or outwards at the end of something. <i>McDermott worked his way through the tail finishing with ten wickets.</i>
track	The soundtrack of a film or video. <i>A Formula One Grand Prix track.</i>
train	Piece of cloth forming the long back section of a gown that is drawn along the floor. <i>Train of mourners.</i>
wake	An island in the western Pacific between Guam and Hawaii. <i>In the wake of the accident no one knew how many had been injured.</i>
way	A general category of things used in the expression in the way of. <i>Didn't know the way home.</i>



- *Walk or move slowly or wearily.*
- *Give advance publicity to (a film, broadcast, or proposal).*
- *Be losing to an opponent in a game or contest.*

- *Follow (a person or animal) by using marks or scent left behind.*
- *Hang down so as to drag along the ground.*

slink	Move smoothly and quietly with gliding steps, in a stealthy or sensuous manner. <i>The fox came slinking through the bracken.</i>

tag	Attach a monitoring tag to. <i>Pieces of DNA tagged with radioactive particles.</i>
tail	Remove or shorten the tail of an animal. <i>Her calligraphy was topped by banners of black ink and tailed like the haunches of fabulous beasts.</i>
tail off	Remove or shorten the tail of an animal.
taper off	Give a point to.
tow	Of a motor vehicle or boat pull another vehicle or boat along with a rope chain or tow bar. <i>The authorities refused to allow the tanker to be towed into their ports.</i>
trace	Discover traces of. <i>Trace a pattern.</i>
track	Make tracks upon. <i>The camera eventually tracked away.</i>
train	Travel by rail or train. <i>Last October I started training for the London Marathon.</i>
