<b>spoor</b>	The track or scent of an animal. <i>The trail is marked by wolf <b>spoor</b>.</i>
<b>stream</b>	The act of flowing or streaming continuous progression. <i>A perfect trout <b>stream</b>.</i>
<b>string</b>	Stringed instruments that are played with a bow. <i>A <b>string</b> of burglaries.</i>
