### **Definitions of "Trainee" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “trainee” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Someone who is being trained.*
- *A person undergoing training for a particular job or profession.*

- apprentice** A beginner.  
An **apprentice** barman.
- learner** Works for an expert to learn a trade.  
A fast **learner**.
- novice** An animal, especially a racehorse, that has not yet won a major prize or reached a sufficient level of performance to qualify for important events.  
The **novice** hurdles.
- probationer** A person who is serving a probationary or trial period in a job or position to which they are newly appointed.
- pupil** A trainee barrister.  
They are former **pupils** of the school.
- starter** A preparation of chemicals to initiate the breakdown of vegetable matter in making compost.  
Material to act as a **starter** for discussion.
- student** A learned person (especially in the humanities); someone who by long study has gained mastery in one or more disciplines.  
A maths **student**.

- curriculum** An integrated course of academic studies.  
*Course components of the school **curriculum**.*
- degree** A measure for arcs and angles.

<b>educator</b>	Someone who educates young people. <i>The perspective of a professional <b>educator</b>.</i>
<b>grad</b>	One-hundredth of a right angle.
<b>graduate</b>	A person who has successfully completed a course of study or training especially a person who has been awarded an undergraduate or first academic degree. <i>The colour is <b>graduated</b> from the middle of the frame to the top.</i>
<b>headmaster</b>	Presiding officer of a school.
<b>homeroom</b>	A classroom in which a group of students assembles daily with the same teacher before dispersing to other classes.
<b>instructor</b>	A person whose occupation is teaching. <i>A driving <b>instructor</b>.</i>
<b>learner</b>	A person who is learning to drive a motor vehicle and has not yet passed a driving test. <i>A fast <b>learner</b>.</i>
<b>matriculate</b>	A person who has matriculated. <i>A total of 123 boys and girls who <b>matriculated</b> last year were registered with his department.</i>
<b>pedagogics</b>	The principles and methods of instruction.
<b>pedagogy</b>	The principles and methods of instruction. <i>The relationship between applied linguistics and language <b>pedagogy</b>.</i>
<b>polytechnic</b>	A technical school offering instruction in many industrial arts and applied sciences.
<b>prentice</b>	Works for an expert to learn a trade. <i>My brother was <b>prenticed</b> to a wheelwright.</i>
<b>pupil</b>	A young person attending school (up through senior high school). <i>Will you take me on as your <b>pupil</b>.</i>
<b>schooling</b>	The training of a horse on the flat or over fences. <i><b>Schooling</b> fences.</i>
<b>schoolmaster</b>	An experienced horse that is used to train or give confidence to inexperienced riders or horses.
<b>student</b>	A school pupil. <i><b>Student</b> loans.</i>

<b>studying</b>	Reading carefully with intent to remember.
<b>teach</b>	A teacher. <i>He came one day each week to <b>teach</b> painting.</i>
<b>teaching</b>	The occupation, profession, or work of a teacher. <i>Good classroom <b>teaching</b> is seldom rewarded.</i>
<b>training</b>	The action of teaching a person or animal a particular skill or type of behaviour. <i>In service <b>training</b> for staff.</i>
<b>tutorial</b>	An account or explanation of a subject, printed or on a computer screen, intended for private study. <i>Online <b>tutorials</b> and reference guides.</i>
<b>undergraduate</b>	Denoting or relating to an undergraduate. <i>A group of Oxford <b>undergraduates</b>.</i>
<b><u>university</u></b>	The body of faculty and students at a university. <i>I went to <b>university</b> at the Sorbonne.</i>
