### Definitions of "Traitor" as a noun

- *A person who says one thing and does another.*
- *A person who betrays someone or something, such as a friend, cause, or principle.*
- *Someone who betrays his country by committing treason.*



## Synonyms of "Traitor" as a noun (10 Words)

- betray** One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
- double-crosser** A person who says one thing and does another.
- double-dealer** A person who says one thing and does another.
- fifth columnist** A quantity of liquor equal to one fifth of a United States gallon.
- judas** The Apostle who betrayed Jesus to his enemies for 30 pieces of silver.  
*A glance through the **Judas** in her front door.*
- quisling** Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force.  
*He had the **Quisling** owner of the factory arrested.*
- renegade** A person who behaves in a rebelliously unconventional manner.  
***Renegades** and Deserters of Heaven who renounce their God for the Favour of Man.*
- treasonist** Someone who betrays his country by committing treason.
- two-timer** Someone who deceives a lover or spouse by carrying on a sexual relationship with somebody else.
- viper** A venomous snake with large hinged fangs, typically having a broad head and stout body, with dark patterns on a lighter background.

## Usage Examples of "Traitor" as a noun

- *He was a traitor to his own class.*

## Associations of "Traitor" (30 Words)

<b><u>apostate</u></b>	Not faithful to religion or party or cause. <i>An <b>apostate</b> Roman Catholic.</i>
<b>betray</b>	Treacherously reveal (information). <i>A double agent who <b>betrayed</b> some 400 British and French agents to the Germans.</i>
<b><u>betrayal</u></b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a <b>betrayal</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>betrayed</b>	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
<b>cheat</b>	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. <i>We were <b>cheated</b> by their clever sounding scheme.</i>
<b>deceive</b>	Cause someone to believe an untruth. <i>I didn't intend to <b>deceive</b> people into thinking it was French champagne.</i>
<b>defector</b>	A person who has abandoned their country or cause in favour of an opposing one. <i>Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defectors</b> to the West.</i>
<b><u>disloyal</u></b>	Deserting your allegiance or duty to leader or cause or principle. <i>She was accused of being <b>disloyal</b> to the government.</i>
<b><u>duplicity</u></b>	Acting in bad faith; deception by pretending to entertain one set of intentions while acting under the influence of another. <i>The president was accused of <b>duplicity</b> in his dealings with Congress.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>They were ungodly and <b>faithless</b>.</i>
<b>fraudulence</b>	A fraudulent or duplicitous representation.
<b>infidelity</b>	Disbelief in a particular religion, especially Christianity. <i>Her <b>infidelity</b> continued after her marriage.</i>
<b>insurgent</b>	In opposition to a civil authority or government. <i>A series of <b>insurgent</b> attacks.</i>
<b>mutineer</b>	A person, especially a soldier or sailor, who rebels or refuses to obey the orders of a person in authority. <i>Those who resisted were denounced as <b>mutineers</b> and treated accordingly.</i>

<b>mutinous</b>	Consisting of or characterized by or inciting to mutiny. <i>The men became <b>mutinous</b> and insubordinate.</i>
<b>perfidious</b>	Deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>A <b>perfidious</b> lover.</i>
<b>perfidy</b>	Betrayal of a trust. <i>It was an example of his <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>quisling</b>	Someone who collaborates with an enemy occupying force. <i>He had the <b>Quisling</b> owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<b>rebel</b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i><b>Rebel</b> forces.</i>
<b>renegade</b>	Become a renegade. <i>An agent who later turns out to be a <b>renegade</b>.</i>
<b>sedition</b>	Arousing to action or rebellion. <i>The letter was declared <b>sedition</b>.</i>
<b>spy</b>	(military) a secret agent hired by a state to obtain information about its enemies or by a business to obtain industrial secrets from competitors. <i>A <b>spy</b> camera.</i>
<b>subversive</b>	A subversive person. <i><b>Subversive</b> literature.</i>
<b>traitorous</b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i><b>Treacherous</b> intrigues.</i>
<b>treachery</b>	Betrayal of trust. <i>The <b>treachery</b> of language.</i>
<b>treason</b>	The crime of murdering someone to whom the murderer owed allegiance, such as a master or husband. <i>Doubt is the ultimate <b>treason</b> against faith.</i>
<b>treasonable</b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b>turncoat</b>	A person who deserts one party or cause in order to join an opposing one. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
<b>unfaithful</b>	Engaging in sexual relations with a person other than one's regular partner in contravention of a previous promise or understanding. <i>Her <b>unfaithful</b> husband.</i>
