- *A half-conscious state characterized by an absence of response to external stimuli, typically as induced by hypnosis or entered by a medium.*
- *A psychological state induced by (or as if induced by) a magical incantation.*
- *A state of mind in which consciousness is fragile and voluntary action is poor or missing; a state resembling deep sleep.*

brown study

Scottish botanist who first observed the movement of small particles in fluids now known as Brownian motion (1773-1858).

daydream

Absentminded dreaming while awake.

*She was lost in a **daydream**.*

daze

A state of stunned confusion or bewilderment.

*He was walking around in a **daze**.*

dream

A state of mind in which someone is or seems to be unaware of their immediate surroundings.

*It was a **dream** of a backhand.*

enchantment

The state of being under a spell; magic.

*A world of mystery and **enchantment**.*

half-conscious state A state of depression or agitation.

haze A very fine cloud of something such as vapour or smoke in the air.
*The gathering **haze** of cigarette smoke.*

hypnotic state A drug that induces sleep.

reverie Absentminded dreaming while awake.
*A knock on the door broke her **reverie**.*

spell A period of indeterminate length (usually short) marked by some action or condition.
*A **spell** of good weather.*

stupor A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility.
*A drunken **stupor**.*

Synonyms of "Trance" as a verb (12 Words)

- becharm** Control by magic spells, as by practicing witchcraft.
- beguile** Attract; cause to be enamored.
*He **beguiled** the voters with his good looks.*
- bewitch** Attract; cause to be enamored.
*A handsome prince who had been **bewitched** by a sorceress.*
- captivate** Attract; cause to be enamored.
*He was **captivated** by her beauty.*
- capture** Capture as if by hunting snaring or trapping.
*The star **captured** a comet.*
- catch** Catch up with and possibly overtake.
*She will **catch** hell for this behavior.*
- charm** Protect through supernatural powers or charms.
*She **charmed** him into giving her all his money.*

enamor Attract cause to be enamored.

enamour Be filled with love for.

*It is not difficult to see why Edward is **enamoured** of her.*

enchant Fill (someone) with great delight; charm.

*The scenery began to **enchant** her.*

entrance Attract; cause to be enamored.

fascinate Attract; cause to be enamored.

*The snake charmer **fascinates** the cobra.*

- *She's been tranced and may need waking.*

amulet	An ornament or small piece of jewellery thought to give protection against evil, danger, or disease.
bewitchment	A magical spell.
<u>captivate</u>	Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm. <i>He was captivated by her beauty.</i>
<u>charisma</u>	Compelling attractiveness or charm that can inspire devotion in others. <i>He has tremendous charisma and stage presence.</i>
<u>charm</u>	Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>A gesticulating figure endeavouring to charm a cobra.</i>

<u>enchant</u>	Fill (someone) with great delight; charm. <i>Marcia had enchanted the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.</i>
<u>enthrall</u>	Hold spellbound.
<u>entrance</u>	The coming of an actor or performer on to a stage. <i>Their entrance into the political arena.</i>
<u>fascinate</u>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>I've always been fascinated by computers.</i>
hypnotic	Relating to or producing hypnosis. <i>Her voice had a hypnotic quality.</i>
hypnotist	A person who carries out hypnosis, either for medical reasons or for entertainment. <i>An expert clinician and skilled hypnotist.</i>
hypnotize	Capture the whole attention of (someone); fascinate. <i>She gazed down hypnotized by the swirling tide.</i>
magic	Move change or create by or as if by magic. <i>The magic of the theatre.</i>
<u>magical</u>	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers. <i>It was a magical evening of pure nostalgia.</i>
<u>magician</u>	Someone who performs magic tricks to amuse an audience. <i>He was the magician of the fan belt.</i>
mesmerize	Hypnotize (someone). <i>He was mesmerized when at the point of death.</i>
narcissist	Someone in love with themselves. <i>Narcissists who think the world revolves around them.</i>
narcotic	Relating to or denoting narcotics or illegal drugs. <i>The substance has a mild narcotic effect.</i>
necromancer	One who practices magic or sorcery. <i>Dr Faustus a necromancer of the 16th century.</i>
painkiller	A medicine used to relieve pain.
<u>paralyzed</u>	Affected with paralysis.
relaxant	A thing having a relaxing effect. <i>A relaxant drug.</i>
sedative	A drug that reduces excitability and calms a person. <i>A mild sedative.</i>

sleeping	Lying with head on paws as if sleeping. <i>He looked at the sleeping child.</i>
soporific	Sleepy or drowsy. <i>The motion of the train had a somewhat soporific effect.</i>
sorcerer	One who practices magic or sorcery.
spell	Orally recite the letters of or give the spelling of. <i>She spelled her husband at the wheel.</i>
spellbind	Put into a trance. <i>The singer held the audience spellbound.</i>
state	The three traditional states of matter are solids fixed shape and volume and liquids fixed volume and shaped by the container and gases filling the container. <i>King Fahd appointed a council to advise him on affairs of state.</i>
wizard	Possessing or using or characteristic of or appropriate to supernatural powers- Shakespeare. <i>How absolutely wizard.</i>
