placidity	A feeling of calmness; a quiet and undisturbed feeling.
quiet	A period of calm weather. <i>After several months of comparative quiet the scandal re erupted in August.</i>
quietness	The fact or state of abstaining from speech. <i>He loved the quietness and stillness of early summer days.</i>
quietude	A state of peace and quiet. <i>A moment of quietude.</i>
repose	Freedom from activity (work or strain or responsibility). <i>In repose her face looked relaxed.</i>
<u>serenity</u>	A title given to a reigning prince or similar dignitary. <i>An oasis of serenity amidst the bustling city.</i>
tranquillity	An untroubled state; free from disturbances. <i>Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the tranquillity of rural life.</i>



Associations of "Tranquility" (30 Words)

acquiescence	Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something. <i>A murmur of acquiescence from the assembly.</i>
calm	Become quiet or calm especially after a state of agitation. <i>His usual calm deserted him.</i>
calmly	With self-possession (especially in times of stress). <i>He spoke slowly and calmly.</i>
<u>calmness</u>	An absence of strong winds or rain. <i>She exuded calmness and good humour.</i>
composed	Serenely self-possessed and free from agitation especially in times of stress. <i>The performer seemed completely composed as she stepped onto the stage.</i>
composure	The state or feeling of being calm and in control of oneself. <i>She was struggling to regain her composure.</i>

coolheaded	Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. <i>Stayed coolheaded in the crisis.</i>
equanimity	Calmness and composure, especially in a difficult situation. <i>She accepted both the good and the bad with equanimity.</i>
<u>hush</u>	Become quiet or still; fall silent. <i>Hush my baby.</i>
noiseless	Accompanied by or introducing no random fluctuations that obscure the real signal or data. <i>The cycle is a noiseless form of transport.</i>
nonviolence	Peaceful resistance to a government by fasting or refusing to cooperate.
pacific	The largest ocean in the world. <i>The result of this pacific policy was that no troops were called up.</i>
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>The Straits were to be open to warships in time of peace.</i>
peaceful	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i>Peaceful times.</i>
<u>placid</u>	Calm and peaceful, with little movement or activity. <i>The placid waters of a small lake.</i>
quiescent	Not active or activated. <i>Strikes were headed by groups of workers who had previously been quiescent.</i>
quiet	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>Sit here as quiet as you can.</i>
quietness	The property of making no sound. <i>A voice disturbed the quietness of the night.</i>
quietude	A state of peace and quiet. <i>A moment of quietude.</i>
repose	Freedom from activity (work or strain or responsibility). <i>In repose her face looked relaxed.</i>
<u>restful</u>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and restful.</i>
reticence	The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more than necessary. <i>The traditional emotional reticence of the British.</i>

<u>serene</u>	Completely clear and fine. <i>Her eyes were closed and she looked very serene.</i>
<u>serenity</u>	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>An oasis of serenity amidst the bustling city.</i>
silence	Stop or suppress (a sound or noise); cause to become silent. <i>Please silence the children in the church.</i>
<u>stillness</u>	A state of no motion or movement. <i>Absolute stillness greeted our gaze.</i>
<u>tranquil</u>	Free from disturbance; calm. <i>Her tranquil gaze.</i>
tranquelize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
tranquillity	The quality or state of being tranquil; calm. <i>Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the tranquillity of rural life.</i>
unflappable	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure. <i>I prided myself on being unflappable even in the most chaotic circumstances.</i>
