- repose** Freedom from activity (work or strain or responsibility).

- serenity** A title given to a reigning prince or similar dignitary.

- tranquillity** An untroubled state; free from disturbances.

- acquiescence** Agreement with a statement or proposal to do something.  
*A murmur of **acquiescence** from the assembly.*
- calm** Become quiet or calm especially after a state of agitation.  
*His usual **calm** deserted him.*
- calmly** With self-possession (especially in times of stress).  
*He spoke slowly and **calmly**.*
- calmness** An absence of strong winds or rain.  
*She exuded **calmness** and good humour.*
- composed** Serenely self-possessed and free from agitation especially in times of stress.  
*The performer seemed completely **composed** as she stepped onto the stage.*
- composure** The state or feeling of being calm and in control of oneself.  
*She was struggling to regain her **composure**.*

<b>coolheaded</b>	Marked by calm self-control (especially in trying circumstances); unemotional. <i>Stayed <b>coolheaded</b> in the crisis.</i>
<b>equanimity</b>	Calmness and composure, especially in a difficult situation. <i>She accepted both the good and the bad with <b>equanimity</b>.</i>
<b><u>hush</u></b>	Become quiet or still; fall silent. <i><b>Hush</b> my baby.</i>
<b>noiseless</b>	Accompanied by or introducing no random fluctuations that obscure the real signal or data. <i>The cycle is a <b>noiseless</b> form of transport.</i>
<b>nonviolence</b>	Peaceful resistance to a government by fasting or refusing to cooperate.
<b>pacific</b>	The largest ocean in the world. <i>The result of this <b>pacific</b> policy was that no troops were called up.</i>
<b>peace</b>	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>The Straits were to be open to warships in time of <b>peace</b>.</i>
<b>peaceful</b>	Peacefully resistant in response to injustice. <i><b>Peaceful</b> times.</i>
<b><u>placid</u></b>	Calm and peaceful, with little movement or activity. <i>The <b>placid</b> waters of a small lake.</i>
<b>quiescent</b>	Not active or activated. <i>Strikes were headed by groups of workers who had previously been <b>quiescent</b>.</i>
<b>quiet</b>	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>Sit here as <b>quiet</b> as you can.</i>
<b>quietness</b>	The property of making no sound. <i>A voice disturbed the <b>quietness</b> of the night.</i>
<b>quietude</b>	A state of peace and quiet. <i>A moment of <b>quietude</b>.</i>
<b>repose</b>	Freedom from activity (work or strain or responsibility). <i>In <b>repose</b> her face looked relaxed.</i>
<b><u>restful</u></b>	Affording physical or mental rest. <i>The rooms were cool and <b>restful</b>.</i>
<b>reticence</b>	The trait of being uncommunicative; not volunteering anything more than necessary. <i>The traditional emotional <b>reticence</b> of the British.</i>



<b><u>serene</u></b>	Completely clear and fine. <i>Her eyes were closed and she looked very <b>serene</b>.</i>
<b><u>serenity</u></b>	The absence of mental stress or anxiety. <i>An oasis of <b>serenity</b> amidst the bustling city.</i>
<b>silence</b>	Stop or suppress (a sound or noise); cause to become silent. <i>Please <b>silence</b> the children in the church.</i>
<b><u>stillness</u></b>	A state of no motion or movement. <i>Absolute <b>stillness</b> greeted our gaze.</i>
<b><u>tranquil</u></b>	Free from disturbance; calm. <i>Her <b>tranquil</b> gaze.</i>
<b>tranquelize</b>	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
<b>tranquillity</b>	The quality or state of being tranquil; calm. <i>Passing cars are the only noise that disturbs the <b>tranquillity</b> of rural life.</i>
<b>unflappable</b>	Not easily perturbed or excited or upset; marked by extreme calm and composure. <i>I prided myself on being <b>unflappable</b> even in the most chaotic circumstances.</i>
