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| <b>pestilence</b>    | A serious (sometimes fatal) infection of rodents caused by <i>Yersinia pestis</i> and accidentally transmitted to humans by the bite of a flea that has bitten an infected animal.<br><i>Racism is a <b>pestilence</b> at the heart of the nation.</i>                              |
| <b>pestilential</b>  | Relating to or tending to cause infectious diseases.<br><i>A <b>pestilential</b> malignancy in the air.</i>   |
