### Definitions of "Transmit" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “transmit” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Cause (something) to pass on from one person or place to another.*
- *Allow (heat, light, sound, electricity, or other energy) to pass through a medium.*
- *Send from one person or place to another.*
- *Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission.*
- *Broadcast over the airwaves, as in radio or television.*
- *Communicate or be a medium for (an idea or emotion).*
- *Transfer to another.*
- *Broadcast or send out (an electrical signal or a radio or television programme).*

<b>air</b>	Expose a room to the open air in order to ventilate it. <i>We cannot <b>air</b> this X rated song.</i>
<b><u>beam</u></b>	Express with a beaming face or smile. <i>The sun s rays <b>beamed</b> down.</i>
<b><u>bear</u></b>	Bring forth. <i>Steamboats <b>bear</b> the traveller out of Kerrerra Sound.</i>
<b>broadcast</b>	Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television. <i>The second method is to <b>broadcast</b> the seeds together with not more than 1 kg to the acre of rapeseed.</i>
<b><u>carry</u></b>	Win in an election. <i>This boat can only <b>carry</b> a small sail.</i>


<u>channel</u>	Direct towards a particular end or object. <i>Meg Ryan plays Avery as if she s <b>channelling</b> Nicole Kidman.</i>
channelise	Cause to form a channel.
channelize	Make a channel for; provide with a channel. <b>Channelize</b> the country for better transportation.
communicate	Transmit (heat or motion). <i>The dining room <b>communicates</b> with the kitchen.</i>
conduct	Transmit a form of energy such as heat or electricity by conduction. <i>He <b>conducted</b> himself with the utmost propriety.</i>
<u>convey</u>	Serve as a means for expressing something. <i>Mr Harvey and his daughter have asked me to <b>convey</b> their very kind regards.</i>
<u>dispatch</u>	Kill intentionally and with premeditation. <i>The government <b>dispatched</b> 150 police to restore order.</i>
<u>emit</u>	Produce and discharge (something, especially gas or radiation). <i>She <b>emitted</b> a sound like laughter.</i>
hand on	Guide or conduct or usher somewhere.
<u>impart</u>	Transmit (knowledge or skills). <i>The teachers <b>imparted</b> a great deal of knowledge to their pupils.</i>
mediate	Occupy an intermediate or middle position or form a connecting link or stage between two others. <i>He <b>mediated</b> a settlement.</i>
pass on	Pass into a specified state or condition.
pipe	Transport by pipeline. <b>Pipe</b> oil water and gas into the desert.
podcast	Make a digital audio file available as a podcast.
<u>publish</u>	Prepare and issue for public distribution or sale. <i>The photo has not been <b>published</b> on her Instagram account.</i>
put on air	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
put on the air	Formulate in a particular style or language.
radio	Communicate or send a message by radio. <i>We <b>radioed</b> for help.</i>
<u>relay</u>	Control or operate by relay. <i>Please <b>relay</b> the news to the villagers.</i>
send	Send a message or letter. <b>Send</b> me your latest results.

<b>send out</b>	Transport commercially.
<b>show</b>	Show in or as in a picture. <i>The whole nation is waiting for him to <b>show</b> leadership.</i>
<b>telecast</b>	Broadcast via television. <i>The programme will be <b>telecast</b> simultaneously to nearly 150 cities.</i>
<b>televisе</b>	Broadcast via television. <i>The network chose not to <b>televisе</b> the opening ceremony.</i>
<b>transfer</b>	Transfer from one place or period to another. <i><b>Transfer</b> the packet from his trouser pockets to a pocket in his jacket.</i>
<b>transport</b>	Transport commercially. <i>The book <b>transported</b> her to new worlds.</i>
<b>videocast</b>	Make available as a videocast. <i>The ceremonies were <b>videocast</b> live on the internet.</i>
<b>wire</b>	Snare an animal with wire. <i>A microphone <b>wired</b> to a loudspeaker.</i>

- *The three bones transmit sound waves to the inner ear.*
- *The programme was transmitted on 7 October.*

### bulletin

Make public by bulletin.

### carry

The act of carrying something.  
*He could not **carry** the cabinet.*

<b>communicate</b>	Impart or pass on (information, news, or ideas). <i>He and his sons haven't <b>communicated</b> for years.</i>
<b>communication</b>	Social contact. <i>Television is an effective means of <b>communication</b>.</i>
<b>consignee</b>	The person to whom merchandise is delivered over.
<u>convey</u>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>It's impossible to <b>convey</b> how lost I felt.</i>
<b>conveyance</b>	Document effecting a property transfer. <i>Adventurers attempt the trail using all manner of <b>conveyances</b> including mountain bikes and motorcycles.</i>
<u>correspondence</u>	Letters, emails, etc. sent or received. <i>The results of two tests were in <b>correspondence</b>.</i>
<b>delivery</b>	(baseball) the act of throwing a baseball by a pitcher to a batter. <i>Her <b>delivery</b> was stilted.</i>
<u>dispatch</u>	Send away towards a designated goal. <i>The government <b>dispatched</b> 150 police to restore order.</i>
<b>email</b>	Send a message by email. <i>Reading <b>email</b> has become the first task of the morning.</i>
<b>ferry</b>	Convey in a ferry or other ship or boat especially across a short stretch of water. <i>Ambulances <b>ferried</b> the injured to hospital.</i>
<b>ferryboat</b>	A boat that transports people or vehicles across a body of water and operates on a regular schedule.
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>The dog <b>fetched</b> the hat.</i>
<u>interact</u>	Communicate or be involved directly. <i>The user <b>interacts</b> directly with the library.</i>
<b>mail</b>	A single delivery or collection of mail. <i>I did not receive any <b>mail</b>.</i>
<b>mailing</b>	Mail sent by a sender at one time. <i>The postmark indicates the time of <b>mailing</b>.</i>
<b>message</b>	Send a message to someone especially by email text app or other electronic means. <i>She <b>messaged</b> the final report by fax.</i>
<u>messenger</u>	Send a document or package by messenger. <i>Could you have it <b>messengered</b> over to me.</i>

<b>post</b>	Assign to a post put into a post. <i>If you hurry you ll catch the <b>post</b>.</i>
<b><u>receiver</u></b>	A person who gets or accepts something that has been sent or given to them. <i>The <b>receiver</b> of a gift.</i>
<b>recipient</b>	A person or thing that receives or is awarded something. <i>The <b>recipient</b> of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
<b><u>relay</u></b>	A signal or broadcast transmitted by a relay. <i>A <b>relay</b> of a performance live from the concert hall.</i>
<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i>It s the spectacle and music that <b>send</b> us not the words.</i>
<b>sender</b>	Set used to broadcast radio or tv signals. <i>Return to <b>sender</b>.</i>
<b>spam</b>	A tinned meat product made mainly from ham. <i>An autogenerated <b>spam</b> website.</i>
<b>transfer</b>	Transferring ownership. <i>A <b>transfer</b> of wealth to the EU s poorer nations.</i>
<b>transport</b>	A convict who was transported to a penal colony. <i>Many possess their own forms of <b>transport</b>.</i>
<b>transportation</b>	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The sentence was one of <b>transportation</b> for life.</i>
