Definitions of "Transmitting" as a noun

- *The act of sending a message; causing a message to be transmitted.*



Synonyms of "Transmitting" as a noun (2 Words)

transmission Communication by means of transmitted signals.
*The **transmission** of the virus.*

transmittal The act of sending a message; causing a message to be transmitted.
*A law prohibiting unlicensed money **transmittals**.*



Associations of "Transmitting" (30 Words)

broadcast Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television.
*A **broadcast** journalist.*

bulletin Make public by bulletin.

carry	An act of carrying something from one place to another. <i>Do you carry kerosene heaters.</i>
communicate	Transmit information. <i>The ability of good teachers to communicate their own enthusiasm.</i>
communication	Something that is communicated by or to or between people or groups. <i>A city providing excellent road and rail communications.</i>
consignee	The person to whom merchandise is delivered over.
convey	Transport or carry to a place. <i>It s impossible to convey how lost I felt.</i>
conveyance	A legal document effecting the transfer of property in the case of an unregistered title. <i>A busy centre for the conveyance of agricultural produce from the Billingshurst area.</i>
correspondence	Communication by the exchange of letters. <i>Sophie wrote a letter to Rosamund with whom she kept up a regular correspondence.</i>
delivery	The act of delivering or distributing something (as goods or mail). <i>His reluctant delivery of bad news.</i>
dispatch	The act of sending off something. <i>The situation might change so he should proceed with dispatch.</i>
email	A message sent by email. <i>Call fax or email for a free demo.</i>
ferry	Convey in a ferry or other ship or boat especially across a short stretch of water. <i>Ambulances ferried the injured to hospital.</i>
ferryboat	A boat that transports people or vehicles across a body of water and operates on a regular schedule.
fetch	The action of fetching. <i>The land could fetch over a million pounds.</i>
interact	Communicate or be involved directly. <i>People who interact daily.</i>
mail	A vehicle such as a train carrying mail. <i>You ve got mail.</i>
mailing	The action or process of sending something by mail. <i>The postmark indicates the time of mailing.</i>
message	Send a message to. <i>An error message.</i>

<u>messenger</u>	Send a document or package by messenger. <i>Nitric oxide is an intercellular messenger.</i>
post	A goalpost. <i>Robertson at the near post headed wide.</i>
<u>receiver</u>	A player who specializes in catching passes. <i>The company is in the hands of the receivers.</i>
recipient	A person who receives something. <i>The recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize.</i>
<u>relay</u>	Control or operate by relay. <i>The wagons were pulled by relays of horses.</i>
send	Send a message or letter. <i>It s the spectacle and music that send us not the words.</i>
sender	A person who sends or transmits a message, letter, email, etc. <i>Senders of unwanted emails.</i>
spam	Send the same message indiscriminately to (a large number of internet users). <i>An autogenerated spam website.</i>
transfer	Someone who transfers or is transferred from one position to another. <i>I went to sleep on the couch before transferring to my bedroom later in the night.</i>
transport	A convict who was transported to a penal colony. <i>The bulk of freight traffic was transported by lorry.</i>
transportation	The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966. <i>The era of global mass transportation.</i>
