<b>make different</b>	Engage in.
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>Feed the larvae to your fish before they <b>metamorphose</b> into adults.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Make partial or minor changes to (something). <i>She may be prepared to <b>modify</b> her views.</i>
<b>recast</b>	Allocate the parts in (a play or film) to different actors. <i>The bell cracked and had to be <b>recast</b>.</i>
<b><u>reconstruct</u></b>	Reorganize (something). <i>From copies of correspondence it is possible to <b>reconstruct</b> the broad sequence of events.</i>
<b>redesign</b>	Design anew, make a new design for. <i>The front seats have been <b>redesigned</b>.</i>
<b><u>redo</u></b>	Make new. <i>A whole day s work has to be <b>redone</b>.</i>
<b>refashion</b>	Fashion (something) again or differently. <i>The industry reshaped and <b>refashioned</b> itself.</i>

<b><u>refine</u></b>	Improve or perfect by pruning or polishing. <i>Sugar was <b>refined</b> by boiling it in huge iron vats.</i>
<b><u>reform</u></b>	Produce by cracking. <b>Reform</b> a political system.
<b><u>remake</u></b>	Make new. <i>The bed would be more comfortable if it were remade.</i>
<b>remodel</b>	Do over, as of (part of) a house. <i>She <b>remodelled</b> the head with careful fingers.</i>
<b>remould</b>	Cast again. <i>Did the welfare state <b>remould</b> capitalism to give it a more human face.</i>
<b>reorder</b>	Make a new request to be supplied with. <i>He fixed his bed and <b>reordered</b> his books.</i>
<b>reorganize</b>	Organize anew, as after a setback. <i>The company <b>reorganized</b> into fewer key areas.</i>
<b>reorient</b>	Orient once again, after a disorientation. <i>Slowly they advanced stopping every so often and then <b>reorienting</b> themselves.</i>
<b>reorientate</b>	Orient once again, after a disorientation.
<b>reshape</b>	Shape or form (something) differently or again. <i>The new foreign minister <b>reshaped</b> the foreign policy of his country.</i>
<b>restyle</b>	Give a new designation to. <i>Nick <b>restyled</b> Rebecca's hair.</i>
<b><u>revamp</u></b>	To patch up or renovate; repair or restore. <b>Revamp</b> my old boots.
<b>revise</b>	Revise or reorganize especially for the purpose of updating and improving. <b>Revise</b> your lecture notes on the topic.
<b><u>rework</u></b>	Use again in altered form. <i>Over the course of our trip the President continually <b>reworked</b> his speech.</i>
<b>transfigure</b>	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>The world is made luminous and is <b>transfigured</b>.</i>
<b><u>transform</u></b>	Subject to a mathematical transformation. <b>Transform</b> energy to light.

**transubstantiate** Change the form or substance of (something) into something different.

***Transubstantiate** one element into another.*

**turn** Cause to change or turn into something different assume new characteristics.

*The cream has **turned** we have to throw it out.*

**undergo a change** Pass through.

**undergo a sea change** Pass through.

**vary** Become different in some particular way, without permanently losing one's or its former characteristics or essence.

*Prices **vary**.*

<b><u>conversion</u></b>	The fact of changing one's religion or beliefs or the action of persuading someone else to change theirs. <i>He insists that real <b>conversion</b> is a matter of the heart.</i>
<b>convert</b>	A person who has been converted to another religious or political belief. <i><b>Convert</b> holdings into shares.</i>
<b>defection</b>	Withdrawing support or help despite allegiance or responsibility. <i>His <b>defection</b> from the Labour Party.</i>
<b>disabuse</b>	Free somebody (from an erroneous belief). <i>He quickly <b>disabused</b> me of my fanciful notions.</i>
<b><u>diversion</u></b>	A turning aside (of your course or attention or concern). <i>A <b>diversion</b> from the main highway.</i>
<b>fluctuation</b>	A wave motion. <i>He kept a record of price <b>fluctuations</b>.</i>
<b><u>flux</u></b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>Since the fall of the wall Berlin has been a city in <b>flux</b>.</i>
<b><u>interchangeable</u></b>	Capable of replacing or changing places with something else. <i>The V8 engines are all <b>interchangeable</b> with each other.</i>
<b>metamorphose</b>	Change or cause to change completely in form or nature. <i>Overnight family houses <b>metamorphose</b> into bed and breakfast as 7 000 visitors roll into town.</i>
<b>modify</b>	Transform (a structure) from its original anatomical form during development or evolution. <i>Please <b>modify</b> this letter to make it more polite.</i>
<b>proselyte</b>	A new convert; especially a gentile converted to Judaism.
<b>recast</b>	Give (a metal object) a different form by melting it down and reshaping it. <i>His doctoral thesis has been <b>recast</b> for the general reader.</i>
<b>remold</b>	Shape again or shape differently.
<b>reshape</b>	Shape anew or differently. <i>The new foreign minister <b>reshaped</b> the foreign policy of his country.</i>
<b>retouch</b>	Give retouches to hair. <i><b>Retouch</b> the roots.</i>
<b><u>ripple</u></b>	Stir up water so as to form ripples. <i>His words set off a <b>ripple</b> of excitement within her.</i>
<b>transfigure</b>	Change completely the nature or appearance of. <i>Jesus was <b>transfigured</b> after his resurrection.</i>

<b><u>transform</u></b>	The product of a transformation. <i>She <b>transformed</b> the clay into a beautiful sculpture.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	(mathematics) a function that changes the position or direction of the axes of a coordinate system. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transition</b>	Cause to convert or undergo a transition. <i>The company had to <b>transition</b> the old practices to modern technology.</i>
<b>transmogrify</b>	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<b><u>variability</u></b>	The quality of being uneven and lacking uniformity. <i>A great deal of <b>variability</b> in quality.</i>
<b><u>variance</u></b>	The second moment around the mean; the expected value of the square of the deviations of a random variable from its mean value. <i>They were at <b>variance</b> with all their previous allies.</i>
<b><u>vary</u></b>	Be at variance with; be out of line with. <i>His moods <b>vary</b> depending on the weather.</i>
<b>wavelet</b>	A small wave of water; a ripple.
