## Transpire as a Verb

### Definitions of "Transpire" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “transpire” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *(of a secret or something unknown) come to be known; be revealed.*
- *Pass through the tissue or substance or its pores or interstices, as of gas.*
- *Prove to be the case.*
- *(of a plant or leaf) give off water vapour through the stomata.*
- *Exude water vapor.*
- *Give off (water) through the skin.*
- *Come about, happen, or occur.*
- *Occur; happen.*
- *Come to light; become known.*



## Synonyms of "Transpire" as a verb (28 Words)

<b>arise</b>	Originate or come into being. <i>New difficulties had <b>arisen</b>.</i>
<b>be disclosed</b>	Be priced at.
<b>be discovered</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b>be made public</b>	Be identical or equivalent to.
<b>be realized</b>	Occupy a certain position or area.
<b>be revealed</b>	Have life, be alive.
<b>be uncovered</b>	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
<b>become apparent</b>	Come into existence.
<b>become known</b>	Undergo a change or development.
<b>befall</b>	Happen, occur, or be the case in the course of events or by chance. <i>He promised that no harm would <b>befall</b> her.</i>

<b>chance</b>	Be the case by chance. <i>They <b>chanced</b> a late holiday.</i>
<b>come about</b>	Reach a destination; arrive by movement or progress.
<b>come out</b>	Have a certain priority.
<b>come to light</b>	Come from; be connected by a relationship of blood, for example.
<b>come to pass</b>	Come to pass arrive as in due course.
<b>crop up</b>	Yield crops.
<b><u>emerge</u></b>	Come out into view, as from concealment. <i>Black ravens <b>emerged</b> from the fog.</i>
<b><u>ensue</u></b>	Happen or occur afterwards or as a result. <i>The difficulties which <b>ensued</b> from their commitment to Cuba.</i>
<b>get out</b>	Attract and fix.
<b>happen</b>	Happen occur or be the case in the course of events or by chance Santayana. <i>Do you <b>happen</b> to know who her doctor is.</i>
<b>leak out</b>	Have an opening that allows light or substances to enter or go out.
<b>materialize</b>	Become actual fact; happen. <i>The train failed to <b>materialize</b>.</i>
<b>occur</b>	Exist or be found to be present in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>The accident <b>occurred</b> at about 3 30 p m.</i>
<b>take place</b>	Occupy or take on.
<b>take shape</b>	Be capable of holding or containing.
<b>transpire</b>	Pass through the tissue or substance or its pores or interstices, as of gas.
<b>turn out</b>	Go sour or spoil.
<b>turn up</b>	Change color.



## Usage Examples of "Transpire" as a verb

- *A cactus does not transpire as freely as most plants.*
- *It transpired that she had worked as spy in East Germany.*
- *As it transpired, he was right.*
- *I'm going to find out exactly what transpired.*
- *Plants transpire.*
- *It transpired that millions of dollars of debt had been hidden in a complex web of transactions.*
- *Moisture is transpired from plants much more quickly than is realized.*
- *Several important events transpired last week.*
