| detritus | The remains of something that has been destroyed or broken up. <i>The streets were foul with detritus.</i> |
| dregs | The remnants of a liquid left in a container, together with any sediment. <i>The dregs of society.</i> |
| drivel | Saliva spilling from the mouth. <i>Don't talk such drivel.</i> |
| dross | The scum formed by oxidation at the surface of molten metals. <i>There are bargains if you have the patience to sift through the dross.</i> |
| folderol | A showy but useless item. <i>All the folderol of the athletic contests and the cheerleaders.</i> |
| <u>garbage</u> | Food that is discarded (as from a kitchen). <i>Garbage littered the estate.</i> |
| gibberish | Unintelligible or meaningless speech or writing; nonsense. <i>He talks gibberish.</i> |
| <u>glass</u> | A drinking container made from glass. <i>She collected old glass.</i> |
| good-for-nothings | A quantity of no importance. |
| humbug | Deceptive or false talk or behaviour. <i>His comments are sheer humbug.</i> |
| ice | A frozen mixture of fruit juice or of flavoured water and sugar. <i>Her hands were as cold as ice.</i> |
| junk | Junk bonds. <i>I only have an hour to get all my junk together.</i> |
| litter | A structure used to transport people, containing a bed or seat enclosed by curtains and carried on men's shoulders or by animals. <i>Always clear up after a picnic and never drop litter.</i> |

waste material

Any materials unused and rejected as worthless or unwanted.

wish-wash

Any thin watery drink.

| <u>wreck</u> | Suffer or undergo shipwreck. <i>Sailors who had the misfortune to be wrecked on these coasts.</i> |
