caricature	A picture, description, or imitation of a person in which certain striking characteristics are exaggerated in order to create a comic or grotesque effect. <i>He looked a caricature of his normal self.</i>
corruption	The process by which a word or expression is changed from its original state to one regarded as erroneous or debased. <i>Corruption of a minor.</i>
distortion	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>The virus causes distortion of the leaves.</i>
farce	The dramatic genre represented by farces. <i>The choreographed confusion of real farce.</i>
farce comedy	A comedy characterized by broad satire and improbable situations.

lampoon	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The magazine fired at God Royalty and politicians using cartoons and lampoons.</i>
<u>misrepresentation</u>	A misleading falsehood. <i>She is seeking damages on allegations of misrepresentation.</i>
<u>mockery</u>	An absurd misrepresentation or imitation of something. <i>In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was mockery.</i>
<u>parody</u>	Humorous or satirical mimicry. <i>The film is a parody of the horror genre.</i>
pasquinade	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way. <i>He delivered a long pasquinade at the expense of my friend.</i>
poor imitation	People without possessions or wealth (considered as a group).
poor substitute	People without possessions or wealth (considered as a group).
put-on	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
sendup	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way.
spoof	A trick played on someone as a joke. <i>A Robin Hood spoof.</i>
takeoff	Humorous or satirical mimicry.

caricature	Represent in or produce a caricature of. <i>He was famous enough to be caricatured by Private Eye.</i>
make a mockery of	Have a bowel movement.
make fun of	Organize or be responsible for.
misrepresent	Represent falsely. <i>You are misrepresenting the views of the government.</i>
mock	Imitate with mockery and derision. <i>The new constitution mocks all democratic principles.</i>
parody	Make a parody of. <i>His speciality was parodying schoolgirl fiction.</i>
ridicule	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>The satirists ridiculed the plans for a new opera house.</i>

derision	The act of deriding or treating with contempt. <i>My stories were greeted with derision and disbelief.</i>
<u>disrepute</u>	The state of being held in low esteem. <i>Because of the scandal the school has fallen into disrepute.</i>
disrespect	A disrespectful mental attitude. <i>Growing disrespect for the rule of law.</i>
flout	Mock; scoff. <i>The advertising code is being flouted.</i>
gibe	Laugh at with contempt and derision. <i>She proved impervious to his sarcastic gibes.</i>
hoot	Of an owl utter a hoot. <i>The audience broke into hoots of laughter.</i>
<u>irony</u>	The expression of one's meaning by using language that normally signifies the opposite, typically for humorous or emphatic effect. <i>Don t go overboard with the gratitude he rejoined with heavy irony.</i>
irreverence	A disrespectful act. <i>An attitude of irreverence towards politicians.</i>
<u>jeer</u>	A rude and mocking remark. <i>Councillors were jeered and heckled.</i>
lampoon	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The actor was lampooned by the press.</i>
<u>mock</u>	Imitate with mockery and derision. <i>He has become the mock of all his contemporaries.</i>
<u>mockery</u>	An absurd misrepresentation or imitation of something. <i>After a mockery of a trial in London he was executed.</i>
<u>parody</u>	Make a parody of. <i>His provocative use of parody.</i>
persiflage	Light teasing. <i>An air of persiflage.</i>
<u>ridicule</u>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>He is held up as an object of ridicule.</i>

sarcasm	Witty language used to convey insults or scorn—Jonathan Swif. <i>He used sarcasm to upset his opponent.</i>
satire	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. <i>The crude satire seems to be directed at the fashionable protest singers of the time.</i>
satirize	Ridicule with satire. <i>The movie satirized the notion of national superiority.</i>
scoff	Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i>His army was the scoff of all Europe.</i>
skit	A short informal performance intended to educate or inform. <i>A skit on daytime magazine programmes.</i>
sneer	A contemptuous or mocking smile, remark, or tone. <i>She sneered at her little sister s efforts to play the song on the piano.</i>
spoof	Make a parody of. <i>That meant that the Americans might not be able to jam or spoof his systems.</i>
