<u>caricature</u>	A picture, description, or imitation of a person in which certain striking characteristics are exaggerated in order to create a comic or grotesque effect. <i>He looked a caricature of his normal self.</i>
corruption	The process by which a word or expression is changed from its original state to one regarded as erroneous or debased. <i>Corruption</i> of a minor.
distortion	A shape resulting from distortion. The virus causes distortion of the leaves.
<u>farce</u>	The dramatic genre represented by farces. The choreographed confusion of real farce .
farce comedy	A comedy characterized by broad satire and improbable situations.



lampoon	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. The magazine fired at God Royalty and politicians using cartoons and <i>lampoon</i> s.
misrepresentation	A misleading falsehood. She is seeking damages on allegations of misrepresentation .
<u>mockery</u>	An absurd misrepresentation or imitation of something. In her bitterness she felt that all rejoicing was mockery .
<u>parody</u>	Humorous or satirical mimicry. The film is a parody of the horror genre.
pasquinade	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way. <i>He delivered a long pasquinade at the expense of my friend.</i>
poor imitation	People without possessions or wealth (considered as a group.
poor substitute	People without possessions or wealth (considered as a group.
put-on	A ludicrous or grotesque act done for fun and amusement.
sendup	A composition that imitates or misrepresents somebody's style, usually in a humorous way.
spoof	A trick played on someone as a joke. A Robin Hood spoof .
takeoff	Humorous or satirical mimicry.

barrack	Lodge in barracks. The granary in which the platoons were barrack ed.
burlesque	Relating to or characteristic of a burlesque. <i>Burlesque</i> clubs.
catcall	Utter catcalls at. Women were the objects of catcall s when they walked by the men s barracks.
charade	A word acted out in an episode of the game of charades. Talk of unity was nothing more than a charade .
<u>comedy</u>	The style or genre represented by comedy films plays and broadcast programmes. A cabaret with music dancing and comedy .



cynicism	An inclination to believe that people are motivated purely by self-interest; scepticism. <i>Cynicism</i> about the future.
deride	Treat or speak of with contempt. <i>He</i> deride <i>d</i> his student s attempt to solve the biggest problem in <i>mathematics</i> .
derision	The act of deriding or treating with contempt. My stories were greeted with derision and disbelief.
<u>disrepute</u>	The state of being held in low esteem. Because of the scandal the school has fallen into disrepute .
disrespect	A disrespectful mental attitude. Growing disrespect for the rule of law.
flout	Mock; scoff. The advertising code is being flout ed.
gibe	Laugh at with contempt and derision. She proved impervious to his sarcastic gibe s.
hoot	Of an owl utter a hoot. The audience broke into hoot s of laughter.
<u>irony</u>	The expression of one's meaning by using language that normally signifies the opposite, typically for humorous or emphatic effect. Don t go overboard with the gratitude he rejoined with heavy irony .
irreverence	A disrespectful act. An attitude of irreverence towards politicians.
<u>jeer</u>	A rude and mocking remark. Councillors were jeer ed and heckled.
lampoon	A speech or text lampooning someone or something. <i>The actor was lampooned by the press.</i>
<u>mock</u>	Imitate with mockery and derision. <i>He has become the mock of all his contemporaries.</i>
<u>mockery</u>	An absurd misrepresentation or imitation of something. After a mockery of a trial in London he was executed.
<u>parody</u>	Make a parody of. <i>His provocative use of parody.</i>
persiflage	Light teasing. An air of persiflage .
<u>ridicule</u>	Subject to laughter or ridicule. <i>He is held up as an object of ridicule.</i>



sarcasm	Witty language used to convey insults or scorn–Jonathan Swif. <i>He used sarcasm to upset his opponent.</i>
<u>satire</u>	A play novel film or other work which uses satire. The crude satire seems to be directed at the fashionable protest singers of the time.
satirize	Ridicule with satire. The movie satirize d the notion of national superiority.
<u>scoff</u>	Speak to someone or about something in a scornfully derisive or mocking way. <i>His army was the scoff of all Europe.</i>
skit	A short informal performance intended to educate or inform. A skit on daytime magazine programmes.
<u>sneer</u>	A contemptuous or mocking smile, remark, or tone. She sneer ed at her little sister s efforts to play the song on the piano.
spoof	Make a parody of. <i>That meant that the Americans might not be able to jam or</i> spoof his systems.
