## Treason as a Noun

### Definitions of "Treason" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “treason” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The crime of murdering someone to whom the murderer owed allegiance, such as a master or husband.*
- *An act of deliberate betrayal.*
- *The action of betraying someone or something.*
- *A crime that undermines the offender's government.*
- *Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior.*
- *The crime of betraying one's country, especially by attempting to kill or overthrow the sovereign or government.*



## Synonyms of "Treason" as a noun (7 Words)

<b>betrayal</b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>These developments represented a <b>betrayal</b> of democracy.</i>
<b>high treason</b>	A public secondary school usually including grades 9 through 12.
<b>lese majesty</b>	Impressiveness in scale or proportion.
<b>perfidy</b>	The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>Hapsburg <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>subversiveness</b>	Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior.
<b>traitorousness</b>	Disloyalty by virtue of subversive behavior.
<b>treachery</b>	Betrayal of trust. <i>The <b>treachery</b> of language.</i>

## Associations of "Treason" (30 Words)

<b><u>apostate</u></b>	A person who renounces a religious or political belief or principle. An <b>apostate</b> Roman Catholic.
<b>betray</b>	Be sexually unfaithful to one's partner in marriage. The spy <b>betrayed</b> his country.
<b><u>betrayal</u></b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. These developments represented a <b>betrayal</b> of democracy.
<b>betray</b>	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
<b>cheat</b>	An act of cheating a fraud or deception. She <b>cheats</b> on her husband.
<b>cheating</b>	Not faithful to a spouse or lover.
<b>deceive</b>	(of a thing) give (someone) a mistaken impression. I didn't intend to <b>deceive</b> people into thinking it was French champagne.
<b>defector</b>	A person who abandons their duty (as on a military post). Staff interviewed escapees and <b>defectors</b> to the West.
<b><u>disloyal</u></b>	(of a remark or thought) demonstrating a lack of loyalty. <b>Disloyal</b> mutterings about his leadership.
<b>disloyalty</b>	The quality of being disloyal. An accusation of <b>disloyalty</b> and betrayal.
<b><u>duplicity</u></b>	Deceitfulness. The president was accused of <b>duplicity</b> in his dealings with Congress.
<b>faithless</b>	Without religious faith. They were ungodly and <b>faithless</b> .
<b>fraudulence</b>	Something intended to deceive; deliberate trickery intended to gain an advantage.
<b>infidelity</b>	The quality of being unfaithful. Her <b>infidelity</b> continued after her marriage.
<b><u>insubordination</u></b>	Defiance of authority. He was dismissed for <b>insubordination</b> .
<b>insurgent</b>	A person fighting against a government or invading force; a rebel or revolutionary. Alleged links with <b>insurgent</b> groups.
<b><u>mutiny</u></b>	Engage in a mutiny against an authority. A <b>mutiny</b> by those manning the weapons could trigger a global war.
<b>perfidious</b>	Deceitful and untrustworthy. The <b>perfidious</b> Judas.

<b>perfidy</b>	The state of being deceitful and untrustworthy. <i>It was an example of his <b>perfidy</b>.</i>
<b>quisling</b>	A traitor who collaborates with an enemy force occupying their country. <i>He had the <b>Quisling</b> owner of the factory arrested.</i>
<b>rebel</b>	A person who takes part in an armed rebellion against the constituted authority especially in the hope of improving conditions. <i>Respect did not prevent children from <b>rebell</b>ing against their parents.</i>
<b>renegade</b>	Become a renegade. <i>Johnson had <b>renegaded</b> from the Confederacy.</i>
<b>seditions</b>	Inciting or causing people to rebel against the authority of a state or monarch. <i>The letter was declared <b>seditions</b>.</i>
<b>traitor</b>	A person who says one thing and does another. <i>He was a <b>traitor</b> to his own class.</i>
<b>traitorous</b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>A lying <b>traitorous</b> insurrectionist.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A <b>treacherous</b> Gestapo agent.</i>
<b>treachery</b>	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>Many died because of his <b>treachery</b>.</i>
<b>treasonable</b>	Having the character of, or characteristic of, a traitor. <i>There was no evidence of <b>treasonable</b> activity.</i>
<b>turncoat</b>	A disloyal person who betrays or deserts his cause or religion or political party or friend etc. <i>They denounced him as a <b>turncoat</b>.</i>
<b>unfaithful</b>	Having sexual relations with someone other than your husband or wife, or your boyfriend or girlfriend. <i>She felt that to sell the house would be <b>unfaithful</b> to her parents memory.</i>
