Definitions of "Treasured" as an adjective

- precious** Of great value; not to be wasted or treated carelessly.
Precious memories.
- wanted** Characterized by feeling or showing fond affection for.
A **wanted** criminal.

adorn

Furnish with power or authority; of kings or emperors.
*Flowers **adorned** the tables everywhere.*

appreciate

Rise in value or price.
*The Germans want to **appreciate** the Deutsche Mark.*

beautification

The act of making something more beautiful.
*The city commissioned the **beautification** of the tunnel with work by five artists.*

belle

A young woman who is the most charming and beautiful of several rivals.
*She was the **belle** of the ball.*

carat

A measure of the purity of gold pure gold being 24 carats.
*A half **carat** diamond ring.*

cherish	Protect and care for (someone) lovingly. <i>I cherish the letters she wrote.</i>
diamond	One of the four suits in a conventional pack of playing cards denoted by a red diamond. <i>He led a small diamond.</i>
fabled	Celebrated in fable or legend. <i>A fabled art collection.</i>
fondly	With foolishly optimistic hope or belief; naively. <i>They fondly believed the cheers were for them.</i>
gem	Decorate with or as with gems. <i>He had the gem set in a ring for his wife.</i>
gemstone	A crystalline rock that can be cut and polished for jewelry.
heirloom	(law) any property that is considered by law or custom as inseparable from an inheritance is inherited with that inheritance. <i>His garden is filled with heirloom vegetables.</i>
invaluable	Having incalculable monetary, intellectual, or spiritual worth. <i>An invaluable source of information.</i>
jade	A semiprecious gemstone that takes a high polish is usually green but sometimes whitish consists of jadeite or nephrite. <i>A silk blouse in a vivid jade green.</i>
jewel	An ornament or piece of jewellery containing a precious stone or stones. <i>She loved dressing up in her jewels.</i>
jewellery	An adornment (as a bracelet or ring or necklace) made of precious metals and set with gems (or imitation gems). <i>She had silver hair and chunky gold jewellery.</i>
jewelry	An adornment (as a bracelet or ring or necklace) made of precious metals and set with gems (or imitation gems).
luxuriously	In an indulgently luxurious manner.
medallion	An oval or circular painting, panel, or design used to decorate a building or textile. <i>Medallions of veal.</i>
nephrite	An amphibole mineral consisting of calcium magnesium silicate in monoclinic crystalline form; a source of jade that is less valuable than from jadeite; once believed to cure kidney disorders.
precious	Held in great esteem for admirable qualities especially of an intrinsic nature. <i>Children are precious.</i>

priceless	So precious that its value cannot be determined. <i>Darling you re priceless.</i>
prize	Denoting something for which a prize is awarded. <i>The prize was a free trip to Europe.</i>
rhinestone	An imitation diamond, used in cheap jewellery and to decorate clothes. <i>Rhinestone earrings.</i>
valuable	A thing that is of great worth, especially a small item of personal property. <i>A valuable friend.</i>
value	Fix or determine the value of assign a value to. <i>They internalize their parents rules and values.</i>
valued	Considered to be important or beneficial; cherished. <i>Triple valued.</i>
worth	Often used ironically worthy of being treated in a particular way. <i>He admitted stealing 10 000 pounds worth of computer systems.</i>
worthiness	The quality or state of having merit or value. <i>You proved your worthiness as a leader.</i>
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>These issues are worthy of further consideration.</i>
