## **Treasurer as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Treasurer" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “treasurer” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The head of the Exchequer.*
- *A person appointed to administer or manage the financial assets and liabilities of a society, company, local authority, or other body.*
- *An officer charged with receiving and disbursing funds.*
- *The minister of finance.*



## Synonyms of "Treasurer" as a noun (7 Words)

- bank clerk** A slope in the turn of a road or track; the outside is higher than the inside in order to reduce the effects of centrifugal force.
- bank teller** A container (usually with a slot in the top) for keeping money at home.
- banker** The person running the table, controlling play, or acting as dealer in some gambling or board games.  
*The horse should be a **banker** for him in the Members race.*
- bursar** A student who holds a bursary.
- clerk** A salesperson in a store.  
*A chapter **clerk**.*
- purser** An officer on a ship who keeps the accounts, especially the head steward on a passenger vessel.

**teller** (in the UK) each of the four officers of the Exchequer responsible for the receipt and payment of moneys.  
*The growing use of automatic **tellers**.*

- accountant** A person whose job is to keep, inspect, and analyse financial accounts.
- accounting** A system that provides quantitative information about finances.  
*He was unable to give a clear **accounting** for his actions.*
- actuarial** Of or relating to the work of an actuary.  
*An **actuarial** consulting firm.*
- assistant** Of or relating to a person who is subordinate to another.  
*An **assistant** manager.*
- auditor** Someone who listens attentively.  
*External **auditors** report on the financial statements.*

<b>bank</b>	A building in which the business of banking transacted. <i>A grassy <b>bank</b>.</i>
<b>banker</b>	A result forecast identically (while other forecasts differ) in several football-pool entries on one coupon. <i>The horse should be a <b>banker</b> for him in the Members race.</i>
<b>bookkeeper</b>	Someone who records the transactions of a business. <i>The business had grown enough to justify hiring a <b>bookkeeper</b>.</i>
<b>bookkeeping</b>	The activity of recording business transactions. <i>I got in a financial muddle because I didn't keep my <b>bookkeeping</b> up to date.</i>
<b>bursar</b>	A student who holds a bursary.
<b>butler</b>	English novelist who described a fictitious land he called Erewhon (1835-1902).
<b>calculator</b>	An expert at calculation (or at operating calculating machines). <i>A pocket <b>calculator</b>.</i>
<b>cashier</b>	A person handling payments and receipts in a shop, bank, or business. <i><b>Cashier</b> the literal sense of this word.</i>
<b>clerical</b>	Of or relating to the clergy. <i>The <b>clerical</b> staff.</i>
<b>clerk</b>	Work as a clerk as in the legal business. <i>Eleven of those who left college this year are <b>clerking</b> in auction stores.</i>
<b>controller</b>	Someone who maintains and audits business accounts. <i>A temperature <b>controller</b>.</i>
<b>counting</b>	The act of counting reciting numbers in ascending order. <i>The <b>counting</b> continued for several hours.</i>
<b>exchequer</b>	The former government office responsible for collecting revenue and making payments on behalf of the sovereign, auditing official accounts, and trying legal cases relating to revenue. <i>An important source of revenue to the sultan's <b>exchequer</b>.</i>
<b>finance</b>	Monetary support for an enterprise. <i>The health service is <b>financed</b> almost entirely by the taxpayer.</i>
<b>ledger</b>	Fish using a ledger. <i>The <b>ledger</b> stone of William Averie.</i>
<b>ministry</b>	Building where the business of a government ministry is transacted. <i>The soldiers were no less in need of his <b>ministry</b>.</i>
<b>profession</b>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>After <b>profession</b> she taught in Maidenhead.</i>

- receptionist** A person employed in a hotel to receive guests and deal with their bookings.
- secretary** A person to whom a secret is entrusted.  
*She was **secretary** of the Women s Labour League.*
- solicitor** A member of the legal profession qualified to deal with conveyancing the drawing up of wills and other legal matters A solicitor may also instruct barristers and represent clients in some courts.  
*She had been a telephone **solicitor** for a Chicago newspaper.*
- steward** A person whose responsibility it is to take care of something.  
*The event was organized and **stewarded** properly.*
- surveyor** Someone who conducts a statistical survey.  
***Surveyors** recorded the species and locations of fallen trees.*
- teller** Someone who tells a story.  
*The growing use of automatic **tellers**.*
- treasury** The British cabinet minister responsible for economic strategy.  
*The landowners estates and assets were seized for the imperial **treasury**.*
- waiter** A person who waits for a time, event, or opportunity.
