## Synonyms of "Trek" as a noun (14 Words)

### belongings

Something owned; any tangible or intangible possession that is owned by someone.

*She didn't have much baggage with her as most of her **belongings** had been sent ahead by sea.*

### **chattels**

Personal as opposed to real property; any tangible movable property (furniture or domestic animals or a car etc.

### **effects**

Property of a personal character that is portable but not used in business.

*She left some of her personal **effects** in the house.*

### expedition

The people involved in an expedition.

*An **expedition** was sent to explore Mars.*

### goods

Things to be transported, as distinct from passengers.

*Imports of luxury **goods**.*

<b>journey</b>	An act of travelling from one place to another. <i>An eight hour train <b>journey</b>.</i>
<b>movables</b>	Personal as opposed to real property; any tangible movable property (furniture or domestic animals or a car etc.)
<b><u>odyssey</u></b>	A long wandering and eventful journey. <i>His <b>odyssey</b> from military man to politician.</i>
<b>personal effects</b>	A short newspaper article about a particular person or group.
<b>possessions</b>	Anything owned or possessed. <i>They took possession of the ball on their own goal line.</i>
<b>safari</b>	An overland journey by hunters (especially in Africa). <i>One week on <b>safari</b>.</i>
<b>stuff</b>	Senseless talk. <i>The mud was horrible <b>stuff</b>.</i>
<b>things</b>	Any movable possession (especially articles of clothing). <i>She packed her <b>things</b> and left.</i>
<b>trip</b>	A mistake. <i>He heard the <b>trip</b> of women s feet overhead.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Trek" as a noun

- *A trek to the South Pole.*
- *I was at the new flat waiting for my trek to arrive.*



## Trek as a Verb

### Definitions of "Trek" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "trek" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Go on a long arduous journey, typically on foot.*
- *Travel constantly from place to place.*
- *Fish using a trek net.*
- *Migrate or journey with one's belongings by ox wagon.*
- *(of an ox) draw a vehicle or pull a load.*
- *Make a long and difficult journey.*
- *Journey on foot, especially in the mountains.*



## Synonyms of "Trek" as a verb (8 Words)

- footslog** Walk heavily and firmly, as when weary, or through mud.  
*They **footslogged** around the two villages.*
- hike** Increase.  
*They **hiked** across the moors.*
- march** March in a procession.  
*Thousands **marched** behind the coffin.*
- slog** Work hard over a period of time.  
*Batsmen careering down the pitch to **slog** the ball up in the air.*
- traipse** Walk or move wearily or reluctantly.  
*Students had to **traipse** all over London to attend lectures.*
- trudge** Walk slowly and with heavy steps, typically because of exhaustion or harsh conditions.  
*I **trudged** up the stairs.*

**walk**      Make walk.  
              We like to **walk** every Sunday.

- *We trekked through the jungle.*
- *'Trek!' he shouted, and we were off.*
- *Many licences are given to men who trek for sport rather than professional fishermen.*
- *My plan is to trek about seeing the world.*
- *We spent the summer trekking in the foothills of the Himalayas.*

<b>alpine</b>	Relating to or denoting skiing downhill. <i>An <b>alpine</b> ski team.</i>
<b>arduous</b>	Involving or requiring strenuous effort; difficult and tiring. <i>Worked their <b>arduous</b> way up the mining valley.</i>
<b>ascend</b>	Become king or queen. <i>We <b>ascended</b> the mountain.</i>
<b>ascent</b>	A movement upward. <i>The first <b>ascent</b> of the Matterhorn.</i>
<b>boost</b>	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>The cut in interest rates will give a further <b>boost</b> to the economy.</i>
<b>camping</b>	The act of encamping and living in tents in a camp. <i>When they were little we went <b>camping</b> in California.</i>
<b>climb</b>	A mountain hill or slope that is climbed. <i>Sales were <b>climbing</b> after prices were lowered.</i>



<b>climber</b>	A mountaineer. <i>Climbers trained up fences and trellises.</i>
<b><u>climbing</u></b>	The sport or activity of climbing mountains or cliffs. <i>His other great interest was <b>climbing</b> especially in the Alps.</i>
<b>guided</b>	Subject to guidance or control especially after launching. <i>A <b>guided</b> missile.</i>
<b><u>hike</u></b>	Pull or lift up (something, especially clothing). <i>A price <b>hike</b>.</i>
<b><u>hiking</u></b>	The activity of going for long walks, especially across country. <i>She enjoys <b>hiking</b> and climbing in her spare time.</i>
<b>jog</b>	A spell of jogging. <i><b>Jog</b> along the canal.</i>
<b>jungle</b>	A place where hoboos camp. <i>We set off into the <b>jungle</b>.</i>
<b>knapsack</b>	A soldier's or hiker's bag with shoulder straps, carried on the back, and typically made of canvas or other weatherproof material.
<b><u>mountain</u></b>	(often followed by `of') a large number or amount or extent. <i>We set off down the <b>mountain</b>.</i>
<b>mountaineer</b>	A person who takes part in mountaineering.
<b>mounting</b>	The action of mounting something. <i>The <b>mounting</b> of rapid fire guns.</i>
<b>picnic</b>	Have or take part in a picnic. <i>We swam and went on <b>picnics</b>.</i>
<b>raise</b>	Raise the level or amount of something. <i><b>Raise</b> a mutiny.</i>
<b>rise</b>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>The sun had just <b>risen</b>.</i>
<b>scale</b>	Size or measure according to a scale. <i>They entertained on a grand <b>scale</b>.</i>
<b>sightseeing</b>	The activity of visiting places of interest in a particular location. <i>A <b>sightseeing</b> tour.</i>
<b>ski</b>	Travel over snow on skis take part in the sport or recreation of skiing. <i>Neither of them had ever been on <b>skis</b> before.</i>
<b>skiing</b>	The action of travelling over snow on skis especially as a sport or recreation Competitive skiing falls into two categories Nordic cross country racing jumping and biathlon and Alpine downhill or straight racing and slalom racing round a series of markers.
