Definitions of "Trembling" as an adjective

- Vibrating slightly and irregularly; as e.g. with fear or cold or like the leaves of an aspen in a breeze.
- Shaking or quivering, typically as a result of anxiety, excitement, or frailty.

Unstable because of poor construction or heavy use.
She managed a shaky laugh.

Vibrating slightly and irregularly; as e.g. with fear or cold or like the leaves of ${f shivering}$ an aspen in a breeze.

A shake or tremble in a person's voice.

quaver

His voice quavered with rage.

Case for holding arrows.

Juliet s lower lip **quiver**ed.

seesaw Move up and down as if on a seesaw.

seismic Relating to earthquakes or other vibrations of the earth and its crust.

There are **seismic** pressures threatening American society.

shake Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state.

Add a few **shake**s of sea salt and black pepper.

shaking A shaky motion.

The **shaking** of his fingers as he lit his pipe.

shiver Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement.

The way he looked at her sent **shiver**s down her spine.

shudder An act of shuddering.

The pound s devaluation sent **shudder**s through the market.

Move or walk in a swinging or swaying manner.

His speech did not **sway** the voters.

An act of swinging.

swing *It took time to get into the swing of things.*

teeter Be unable to decide between different courses; waver.

She **teeter**ed between tears and anger.

thrill Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input.

Thrill to the magic of the world s greatest guitarist.

tremor Undergo a tremor or tremors.

A **tremor** of unease.

tremulous (of the voice) quivering as from weakness or fear.

Spoke timidly in a **tremulous** voice.

wacillate Waver between different opinions or actions; be indecisive.

The line on the monitor **vacillate**d.



vibe A distinctive emotional aura experienced instinctively.

He **vibe**d pure hate in my direction.

vibrate (of a sound) resonate; continue to be heard.

The bumblebee **vibrate**d its wings for a few seconds.

vibration A distinctive emotional aura experienced instinctively.

That place gave me bad **vibration**s.

wag

A single rapid movement from side to side.

She **wag**ged a finger at Elinor.

waver Move or sway in a rising and falling or wavelike pattern.

His love for her had never wavered.

wobble An unsteady movement from side to side.

His knees **wobble**d.
