<b>fantastic</b>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i><b>Fantastic</b> figures with bulbous heads the circumference of a bushel.</i>
<b>first-class</b>	Very good; of the highest quality.
<b>first-rate</b>	Of the highest quality.
<b>frightful</b>	Extremely distressing. <i>A <b>frightful</b> crime of decapitation.</i>
<b>gargantuan</b>	Enormous. <i>A <b>gargantuan</b> appetite.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e.g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>A <b>giant</b> meteorite.</i>

<b><u>gigantic</u></b>	Of very great size or extent; huge or enormous. <b><i>Gigantic</i></b> disappointment.
<b>glorious</b>	Having, worthy of, or bringing fame or admiration. A <b><i>glorious</i></b> work of art.

<b>resounding</b>	Characterized by resonance. <i>The evening was a <b>resounding</b> success.</i>
