- direction** Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.

<b>fashion</b>	The production and marketing of new styles of clothing and cosmetics. <i>In an abrasive <b>fashion</b>.</i>
<b>inclination</b>	The dip of a magnetic needle. <i>Fanny showed little <b>inclination</b> to talk about anything serious.</i>
<b>leaning</b>	The property possessed by a line or surface that departs from the vertical. <i>He felt <b>leanings</b> toward frivolity.</i>
<b>mania</b>	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>Many people suffering from <b>mania</b> do not think anything is wrong.</i>
<u><b>mode</b></u>	A set of musical notes forming a scale and from which melodies and harmonies are constructed. <i>His preferred <b>mode</b> of travel was a kayak.</i>
<b>movement</b>	A campaign undertaken by a political social or artistic movement. <i>He had a bowel <b>movement</b>.</i>
<b>rage</b>	Violent state of the elements. <i>His face turned red with <b>rage</b>.</i>
<b>run</b>	A race run on foot. <i>He broke into a <b>run</b>.</i>
<u><b>shift</b></u>	The key on the typewriter keyboard that shifts from lower case letters to upper case letters. <i>His constant <b>shifting</b> disrupted the class.</i>
<b>style</b>	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>The pillars are no exception to the general <b>style</b>.</i>
<b>swing</b>	Mechanical device used as a plaything to support someone swinging back and forth. <i>The party went with a <b>swing</b>.</i>
<u><b>tendency</b></u>	An attitude of mind especially one that favors one alternative over others. <i>For students there is a <b>tendency</b> to socialize in the evenings.</i>
<u><b>vogue</b></u>	General acceptance or favour; popularity. <i>Crochet garments are in <b>vogue</b> this season.</i>

<b><u>lean</u></b>	Cause to lean or incline. <i>She <b>leaned</b> over the banister.</i>
<b>move</b>	Change location move travel or proceed also metaphorically. <i>Can you <b>move</b> your car so I can get mine out.</i>
<b><u>sheer</u></b>	Cause to sheer. <i>She <b>sheered</b> her car around the obstacle.</i>
<b><u>shift</u></b>	Use a shift key on a keyboard. <i><b>Shift</b> one's attention.</i>
<b><u>slew</u></b>	Of an electronic device undergo slewing. <i>He <b>slewed</b> the aircraft round before it settled on the runway.</i>
<b>slue</b>	Move obliquely or sideways, usually in an uncontrolled manner.

<b><u>veer</u></b>	Suddenly change an opinion, subject, type of behaviour, etc. <i>An oil tanker that had <b>veered</b> off course.</i>

<b>liking</b>	A taste for. <i>She developed a <b>liking</b> for gin.</i>
<b>notion</b>	A conception of or belief about something. <i>She had a <b>notion</b> to ring her friend at work.</i>
<b>penchant</b>	A strong liking. <i>He has a <b>penchant</b> for adopting stray dogs.</i>
<b>popularity</b>	The quality of being widely admired or accepted or sought after. <i>His charm soon won him affection and <b>popularity</b>.</i>
<b>predilection</b>	A preference or special liking for something; a bias in favour of something. <i>A <b>predilection</b> for expensive cars.</i>
<b>predispose</b>	Make susceptible. <i>This illness <b>predisposes</b> you to gain weight.</i>
<b>predisposition</b>	A liability or tendency to suffer from a particular condition, hold a particular attitude, or act in a particular way. <i>A child may inherit a <b>predisposition</b> to schizophrenia.</i>
<b>preference</b>	A thing preferred. <i><b>Preference</b> is given to those who make a donation.</i>
<b>proclivity</b>	A tendency to choose or do something regularly; an inclination or predisposition towards a particular thing. <i>A <b>proclivity</b> for hard work.</i>
<b>proneness</b>	Liability to suffer from or experience something disagreeable; susceptibility. <i>His <b>proneness</b> to injury will seriously mar a promising career.</i>
<b>propensity</b>	An inclination or natural tendency to behave in a particular way. <i>Their innate <b>propensity</b> to attack one another.</i>
<b>recent</b>	Of the immediate past or just previous to the present time. <i>A <b>recent</b> issue of the journal.</i>
<b>savor</b>	Give taste to. <i><b>Savor</b> the soup.</i>

<b>savour</b>	The taste experience when a savoury condiment is taken into the mouth. <i>The subtle <b>savour</b> of wood smoke.</i>
<b>strategy</b>	An elaborate and systematic plan of action. <i>He was a genius when it came to military <b>strategy</b>.</i>
<b><u>streak</u></b>	Cover a surface with streaks. <i>Lucy had a ruthless <b>streak</b>.</i>
<b>temperament</b>	The adjustment of intervals in tuning a piano or other musical instrument so as to fit the scale for use in different keys in equal temperament the octave consists of twelve equal semitones. <i>He had begun to show signs of <b>temperament</b>.</i>
