agitation	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>Widespread agitation for social reform.</i>
<u>alarm</u>	An alarm clock. <i>Some experts view the plan with alarm.</i>
anxiety	A nervous disorder marked by excessive uneasiness and apprehension, typically with compulsive behaviour or panic attacks. <i>The housekeeper's eager anxiety to please.</i>
apprehension	Understanding; grasp. <i>The student looked around the examination room with apprehension.</i>
apprehensiveness	Fearful expectation or anticipation.
consternation	A feeling of anxiety or dismay, typically at something unexpected. <i>To her consternation her car wouldn't start.</i>

discomposure	Anxious embarrassment. <i>She laughed to mask her discomposure.</i>
dismay	Concern and distress caused by something unexpected. <i>To his dismay she left him.</i>
disquiet	The trait of seeming ill at ease. <i>Public disquiet about animal testing.</i>
disquietude	Feelings of anxiety that make you tense and irritable. <i>Such passages reflect a sense of disquietude of alienation even.</i>
<u>dread</u>	Dreadlocks. <i>Lyon combed his fingers through Curtis dreads.</i>
fear	A mixed feeling of dread and reverence. <i>They hushed it up out of fear of public reaction.</i>
fearfulness	The trait of being afraid.
<u>foreboding</u>	An unfavorable omen. <i>A steadily escalating sense of foreboding.</i>
jumpiness	The anxious feeling you have when you have the jitters.
misgivings	Uneasiness about the fitness of an action.
<u>nervousness</u>	The anxious feeling you have when you have the jitters. <i>There was a trace of nervousness in his voice.</i>
<u>panic</u>	Sudden mass fear and anxiety over anticipated events. <i>Panic in the stock market.</i>
perturbation	Anxiety; mental uneasiness. <i>These shifts and swings in wildlife populations are possibly related to climatic perturbations.</i>
tension	A stress that produces an elongation of an elastic physical body. <i>The coup followed months of tension between the military and the government.</i>
<u>trembling</u>	A reflex motion caused by cold or fear or excitement. <i>The disease is a degenerative disorder that causes trembling of the hands arms or legs.</i>
<u>unease</u>	Anxiety or discontent. <i>Public unease about defence policy.</i>
uneasiness	The trait of seeming ill at ease. <i>I sensed the uneasiness of people around me.</i>
<u>worry</u>	A strong feeling of anxiety. <i>Her son had been a constant source of worry to her.</i>

acrophobia	Extreme or irrational fear of heights.
agitation	A state of agitation or turbulent change or development. <i>She was wringing her hands in agitation.</i>
agoraphobia	A morbid fear of open spaces (as fear of being caught alone in some public place.
angst	A feeling of persistent worry about something trivial. <i>The existential angst of the middle classes.</i>
anxiety	A relatively permanent state of worry and nervousness occurring in a variety of mental disorders, usually accompanied by compulsive behavior or attacks of panic. <i>The housekeeper's eager anxiety to please.</i>
apprehension	The cognitive condition of someone who understands. <i>The student looked around the examination room with apprehension.</i>
claustrophobia	A morbid fear of being closed in a confined space. <i>The small stuffy room had begun to give him claustrophobia.</i>
delusion	(psychology) an erroneous belief that is held in the face of evidence to the contrary. <i>The delusion of being watched.</i>
disquiet	The trait of seeming ill at ease. <i>World leaders are surely disquieted by the prospect of a global economic meltdown.</i>
dread	A person with dreadlocks. <i>The thought of returning to London filled her with dread.</i>
fear	A feeling of anxiety concerning the outcome of something or the safety of someone. <i>She observed the other guests without fear of attracting attention.</i>
fright	Frighten. <i>I jumped up in fright.</i>
frighten	Drive out by frightening. <i>At his age I guess he doesn't frighten any more.</i>

horror	A thing causing a feeling of horror. <i>A horror film.</i>
malaise	A general feeling of discomfort, illness, or unease whose exact cause is difficult to identify. <i>A general air of malaise.</i>
misgiving	Doubt about someone's honesty. <i>We have misgivings about the way the campaign is being run.</i>
neurotic	A neurotic person. <i>He seemed a neurotic self obsessed character.</i>
panic	Cause sudden fear in or fill with sudden panic. <i>Talk of love panicked her.</i>
paranoiac	A person suffering from paranoia. <i>Nonsensical paranoiac ramblings.</i>
phobia	An anxiety disorder characterized by extreme and irrational fear of simple things or social situations. <i>Phobic disorder is a general term for all phobias.</i>
phobic	Having or involving an extreme or irrational fear of or aversion to something. <i>She s phobic about spiders.</i>
qualm	A mild state of nausea. <i>Military regimes generally have no qualms about controlling the press.</i>
scare	Become scared. <i>She has been given the all clear after a breast cancer scare.</i>
scared	Made afraid. <i>I was scared that people were going to take pictures of me.</i>
terror	Terrorism. <i>People fled in terror.</i>
timidity	Fearfulness in venturing into new and unknown places or activities. <i>She believes everyone can overcome their timidity.</i>
turmoil	A violent disturbance. <i>He endured years of inner turmoil.</i>
uneasiness	The trait of seeming ill at ease. <i>The media often express a general uneasiness with animal research.</i>
unrest	A feeling of disturbance and dissatisfaction in a person. <i>Social unrest.</i>

upheaval

A state of violent disturbance and disorder (as in politics or social conditions generally).

*The first **upheaval** produced a hill which was called Roof Mountain.*
