disappoint The governing coalition had bitterly **disappoint**ed the hopes of its

voters.

disappointment A person or thing that causes disappointment.

To her **disappointment** there was no chance to talk privately with Luke.

distressBring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship.

They said the baby was in distress.

distressedAfflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief.

I was **distressed** at the news of his death.

endure Persist for a specified period of time.

The new secretary had to **endure** a lot of unprofessional remarks.

gloom Partial or total darkness.

A black yew **gloom** d the stagnant air.

Intense sorrow, especially caused by someone's death.

She was overcome with **grief**.

grieve Feel intense sorrow.

She **grieve**d for her father.

Emotional anguish or grief, typically caused by the loss or absence of

heartache someone loved.

A good friend understands your **heartache**s as well as your joys.

heaviness A mentally oppressive feeling, especially of sadness or grief.

The **heaviness** of a hop aroma.

lamentable Bad; unfortunate.

The industry is in a **lamentable** state.

lamentation The passionate and demonstrative activity of expressing grief.

suffering Psychological suffering.

Torment emotionally or mentally.

The journey must have been a **torment** for them.

The dramatic genre represented by tragedies.

A tragedy that killed 95 people.

woe Great sorrow or distress (often used hyperbolically.

To add to his **woe**s customers have been spending less.
