(law) the determination of a person's innocence or guilt by due process of law.  
*His mother in law s visits were a great **trial** for him.*

### **visitation**

The appearance of a divine or supernatural being.  
*Boring **visitations** took up most of the afternoon.*

## Associations of "Tribulations" (30 Words)

<b>affliction</b>	A cause of great suffering and distress. <i>A crippling <b>affliction</b> of the nervous system.</i>
<b>agony</b>	Extreme physical or mental suffering. <i>He crashed to the ground in <b>agony</b>.</i>
<b>anguish</b>	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <i>I spent the next two weeks <b>anguishing</b> about whether I d made the right decision.</i>
<b>bibliophile</b>	Someone who loves (and usually collects) books.
<b>condolence</b>	An expression of sympathy with another's grief. <i>They sent their <b>condolences</b>.</i>



<b>despair</b>	Lose or be without hope. <i>In the depths of <b>despair</b>.</i>
<b><u>desperately</u></b>	Used to emphasize the extreme degree of something. <i>He looked around <b>desperately</b>.</i>
<b>despondency</b>	Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless. <i>An air of <b>despondency</b>.</i>
<b>dirge</b>	A song or piece of music that is considered too slow, miserable, or boring. <i>After his ten minute <b>dirge</b> the audience booed.</i>
<b>disappoint</b>	Fail to meet the hopes or expectations of. <i>The governing coalition had bitterly <b>disappointed</b> the hopes of its voters.</i>
<b><u>disappointment</u></b>	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>To her <b>disappointment</b> there was no chance to talk privately with Luke.</i>
<b>distress</b>	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>They said the baby was in <b>distress</b>.</i>
<b>distressed</b>	Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. <i>I was <b>distressed</b> at the news of his death.</i>
<b><u>endure</u></b>	Persist for a specified period of time. <i>The new secretary had to <b>endure</b> a lot of unprofessional remarks.</i>
<b>gloom</b>	Partial or total darkness. <i>A black yew <b>gloom</b> d the stagnant air.</i>
<b><u>grief</u></b>	Intense sorrow, especially caused by someone's death. <i>She was overcome with <b>grief</b>.</i>
<b>grieve</b>	Feel intense sorrow. <i>She <b>grieved</b> for her father.</i>
<b>heartache</b>	Emotional anguish or grief, typically caused by the loss or absence of someone loved. <i>A good friend understands your <b>heartaches</b> as well as your joys.</i>
<b>heaviness</b>	A mentally oppressive feeling, especially of sadness or grief. <i>The <b>heaviness</b> of a hop aroma.</i>
<b>lamentable</b>	Bad; unfortunate. <i>The industry is in a <b>lamentable</b> state.</i>
<b>lamentation</b>	The passionate and demonstrative activity of expressing grief. <i>Scenes of <b>lamentation</b>.</i>

<b><u>melancholy</u></b>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>At the centre of his music lies a profound <b>melancholy</b> and nostalgia.</i>
<b><u>mourn</u></b>	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>Isobel <b>mourned</b> her husband.</i>
<b>rue</b>	European strong-scented perennial herb with grey-green bitter-tasting leaves; an irritant similar to poison ivy. <i>Ferguson will <b>rue</b> the day he turned down that offer.</i>
<b>sadness</b>	The state of being sad. <i>It is one of life's <b>sadnesses</b>.</i>
<b><u>sorrow</u></b>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>A bereaved person needs time to work through their <b>sorrow</b>.</i>
<b>suffering</b>	Psychological suffering. <i>His disregard for the <b>sufferings</b> of his fellow countrymen.</i>
<b>torment</b>	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>The journey must have been a <b>torment</b> for them.</i>
<b><u>tragedy</u></b>	The dramatic genre represented by tragedies. <i>A <b>tragedy</b> that killed 95 people.</i>
<b>woe</b>	Great sorrow or distress (often used hyperbolically). <i>To add to his <b>woes</b> customers have been spending less.</i>
