Synonyms of "Tribulations" as a noun (2 Words)

trial

(law) the determination of a person's innocence or guilt by due process of law.
*His mother in law's visits were a great **trial** for him.*

visitation

The appearance of a divine or supernatural being.
*Boring **visitations** took up most of the afternoon.*

Associations of "Tribulations" (30 Words)

affliction	A cause of great suffering and distress. <i>A crippling affliction of the nervous system.</i>
agony	Extreme physical or mental suffering. <i>He crashed to the ground in agony.</i>
anguish	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <i>I spent the next two weeks anguishing about whether I d made the right decision.</i>
bibliophile	Someone who loves (and usually collects) books.
condolence	An expression of sympathy with another's grief. <i>They sent their condolences.</i>

despair	Lose or be without hope. <i>In the depths of despair.</i>
<u>desperately</u>	Used to emphasize the extreme degree of something. <i>He looked around desperately.</i>
despondency	Feeling downcast and disheartened and hopeless. <i>An air of despondency.</i>
dirge	A song or piece of music that is considered too slow, miserable, or boring. <i>After his ten minute dirge the audience booed.</i>
disappoint	Fail to meet the hopes or expectations of. <i>The governing coalition had bitterly disappointed the hopes of its voters.</i>
<u>disappointment</u>	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>To her disappointment there was no chance to talk privately with Luke.</i>
distress	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>They said the baby was in distress.</i>
distressed	Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. <i>I was distressed at the news of his death.</i>
<u>endure</u>	Persist for a specified period of time. <i>The new secretary had to endure a lot of unprofessional remarks.</i>
gloom	Partial or total darkness. <i>A black yew gloom d the stagnant air.</i>
<u>grief</u>	Intense sorrow, especially caused by someone's death. <i>She was overcome with grief.</i>
grieve	Feel intense sorrow. <i>She grieved for her father.</i>
heartache	Emotional anguish or grief, typically caused by the loss or absence of someone loved. <i>A good friend understands your heartaches as well as your joys.</i>
heaviness	A mentally oppressive feeling, especially of sadness or grief. <i>The heaviness of a hop aroma.</i>
lamentable	Bad; unfortunate. <i>The industry is in a lamentable state.</i>
lamentation	The passionate and demonstrative activity of expressing grief. <i>Scenes of lamentation.</i>

<u>melancholy</u>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>At the centre of his music lies a profound melancholy and nostalgia.</i>
<u>mourn</u>	Observe the customs of mourning after the death of a loved one. <i>Isobel mourned her husband.</i>
rue	European strong-scented perennial herb with grey-green bitter-tasting leaves; an irritant similar to poison ivy. <i>Ferguson will rue the day he turned down that offer.</i>
sadness	The state of being sad. <i>It is one of life's sadnesses.</i>
<u>sorrow</u>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>A bereaved person needs time to work through their sorrow.</i>
suffering	Psychological suffering. <i>His disregard for the sufferings of his fellow countrymen.</i>
torment	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>The journey must have been a torment for them.</i>
<u>tragedy</u>	The dramatic genre represented by tragedies. <i>A tragedy that killed 95 people.</i>
woe	Great sorrow or distress (often used hyperbolically). <i>To add to his woes customers have been spending less.</i>
