double-dealing	Acting in bad faith; deception by pretending to entertain one set of intentions while acting under the influence of another.
<u>duplicity</u>	The state of being double. <i>The president was accused of duplicity in his dealings with Congress.</i>
fraud	Wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. <i>Prosecutions for social security frauds.</i>
fraudulence	A fraudulent or duplicitous representation.
guile	The quality of being crafty. <i>He used all his guile and guts to free himself from the muddle he was in.</i>
hanky panky	Verbal misrepresentation intended to take advantage of you in some way.
hocus-pocus	Verbal misrepresentation intended to take advantage of you in some way.

intrigue	A crafty and involved plot to achieve your (usually sinister) ends. <i>Within the region's borders is a wealth of interest and intrigue.</i>
jiggery-pokery	Verbal misrepresentation intended to take advantage of you in some way.
legerdemain	Skilful use of one's hands when performing conjuring tricks. <i>A classic piece of management legerdemain.</i>
sharp practice	A long thin sewing needle with a sharp point.
shenanigan	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them).
skulduggery	Verbal misrepresentation intended to take advantage of you in some way. <i>A firm that investigates commercial skulduggery.</i>
skulduggery	Verbal misrepresentation intended to take advantage of you in some way.
sleight of hand	Adroitness in using the hands.
slickness	A film of oil or garbage floating on top of water. <i>He could feel the slickness of the tiller.</i>
slyness	Shrewdness as demonstrated by being skilled in deception.
sophistry	The use of clever but false arguments, especially with the intention of deceiving. <i>Trying to argue that I had benefited in any way from the disaster was pure sophistry.</i>
subterfuge	Deceit used in order to achieve one's goal. <i>I hated all the subterfuges I hated lying to you.</i>
swindling	The act of swindling by some fraudulent scheme.
underhandedness	Secretive or dishonest behaviour. <i>He rules with a combination of threats and underhandedness.</i>
wile	Devious or cunning stratagems employed in manipulating or persuading someone to do what one wants. <i>She didn't employ any feminine wiles to capture his attention.</i>
wiles	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them).

feint	Any distracting or deceptive maneuver (as a mock attack). <i>Adam feinted with his right and then swung a left.</i>
fraud	Wrongful or criminal deception intended to result in financial or personal gain. <i>He was convicted of fraud.</i>

fraudulence	The quality of being fraudulent.
guile	Shrewdness as demonstrated by being skilled in deception. <i>He used all his guile and guts to free himself from the muddle he was in.</i>
hoax	Subject to a playful hoax or joke. <i>A hoax 999 call.</i>
hoodwink	Conceal one's true motives from especially by elaborately feigning good intentions so as to gain an end. <i>Staff were hoodwinked into thinking the cucumber was a sawn off shotgun.</i>
humbug	A boiled sweet, especially one flavoured with peppermint. <i>Poor Dave is easily humbugged.</i>
manipulation	The action of touching with the hands (or the skillful use of the hands) or by the use of mechanical means. <i>Conscious manipulations of oral language.</i>
perfidy	An act of deliberate betrayal. <i>It was an example of his perfidy.</i>
scam	Deprive of by deceit. <i>A guy that scams old pensioners out of their savings.</i>
skulduggery	Verbal misrepresentation intended to take advantage of you in some way. <i>A firm that investigates commercial skulduggery.</i>
sly	Having or showing a cunning and deceitful nature. <i>A sly sip of water.</i>
subterfuge	Something intended to misrepresent the true nature of an activity. <i>He wasn't sick it was just a subterfuge.</i>
wile	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them). <i>She didn't employ any feminine wiles to capture his attention.</i>
wily	Marked by skill in deception. <i>A wily old attorney.</i>
