

• Earnest and conscientious activity intended to do or accomplish something.






Synonyms of "Tries" as a noun (4 Words)

effort	A force exerted by a machine or in a process. The book was her finest effort .
endeavor	Earnest and conscientious activity intended to do or accomplish something. <i>Wished him luck in his endeavor.</i>
endeavour	An enterprise or undertaking. A portfolio of business endeavour s.

Tries as a Verb

Definitions of "Tries" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "tries" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of.
- Examine or hear (evidence or a case) by judicial process.



- Take a sample of.
- Put to the test, as for its quality, or give experimental use to.
- Give pain or trouble to.
- Melt (fat or lard) in order to separate out impurities.
- Test the limits of.
- Make an effort or attempt.
- Put on a garment in order to see whether it fits and looks nice.

adjudicate	Bring to an end; settle conclusively. We asked him to adjudicate at the local flower show.
<u>assay</u>	Make an effort or attempt. I assay ed a little joke of mine on him.
attempt	Make an effort or attempt. Troops shot civilians who attempt ed to flee.



essay	Attempt or try. The infant had essay ed a few wobbly steps.
examine	Question or examine thoroughly and closely. This forced us to examine every facet of our business.
<u>hear</u>	Examine or hear evidence or a case by judicial process. <i>He did not hear very well.</i>
<u>judge</u>	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of. It is hard to judge whether such opposition is justified.
prove	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. The scheme has prove d a great success.
render	To surrender someone or something to another. He would render income tax returns at the end of the year.
<u>sample</u>	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>Bone marrow cells were sampled.</i>
seek	Search for and find someone or something. They came here to seek shelter from biting winter winds.
strain	Separate by passing through a sieve or other straining device to separate out coarser elements. <i>Strain</i> the custard into a bowl.
stress	Put stress on utter with an accent. She was anxious to stress that her daughter s safety was her only concern.
taste	Perceive by the sense of taste. The spinach taste s delicious.
test	Judge or measure someone s proficiency or knowledge by means of a test. <i>The teacher tests us every week.</i>
try on	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of.
try out	Make an effort or attempt.

<u>assay</u>	Analyze (chemical substances. I assay ed a little joke of mine on him.
attempt	Make an effort or attempt. <i>The expedition was the first to attempt Everest.</i>
<u>conscientiously</u>	In a thorough and responsible way. A conscientiously detailed legislative history.
contribute	Contribute to some cause. <i>He contributed articles to the magazine.</i>
difficult	(of a person) not easy to please or satisfy; awkward. <i>A difficult</i> child.
effort	A vigorous or determined attempt. <i>He got an A for effort.</i>



endeavor	Attempt by employing effort. Wished him luck in his endeavor .
endeavour	A purposeful or industrious undertaking (especially one that requires effort or boldness. An endeavour to reduce serious injury.
exertion	Use of physical or mental energy; hard work. A well earned rest after their exertion s.
<u>impossible</u>	(of a person) very unreasonable. A seemingly impossible task.
impracticable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved</i> impracticable because of its fragility.
<u>inconceivable</u>	Totally unlikely. They behaved with inconceivable cruelty.
instigation	The verbal act of urging on. The Domesday Survey was compiled at the instigation of William I.
<u>mission</u>	A group of people sent on a mission. A confidential mission to London.
overexertion	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
pains	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
render	To surrender someone or something to another. The estate render s some revenue for the family.
strenuous	Taxing to the utmost; testing powers of endurance- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>Strenuous</i> exercise.
strive	Struggle or fight vigorously. We must strive to secure steady growth.
striving	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
struggling	Engaged in a struggle to overcome especially poverty or obscurity. A struggling actor.
taxing	Physically or mentally demanding. They find the work too taxing .
toil	Exhausting physical labour. A life of toil .
travail	Work hard. A woman in travail .
unacceptable	Not adequate to give satisfaction. A word unacceptable in polite society.



<u>unbelievable</u>	Not able to be believed; unlikely to be true. Unbelievable or not it happened.
unimaginable	Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend. Lives of almost unimaginable deprivation.
<u>unlikely</u>	Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred. A butcher is unlikely to preach vegetarianism.
<u>unthinkable</u>	Incapable of being conceived or considered. It was unthinkable that John could be dead.
workmanlike	Showing efficient competence but not inspiration. The book is a workmanlike job with chronology and bibliography and index.
