- *Examine or hear (evidence or a case) by judicial process.*

- *Take a sample of.*
- *Put to the test, as for its quality, or give experimental use to.*
- *Give pain or trouble to.*
- *Melt (fat or lard) in order to separate out impurities.*
- *Test the limits of.*
- *Make an effort or attempt.*
- *Put on a garment in order to see whether it fits and looks nice.*

essay	Attempt or try. <i>The infant had essayed a few wobbly steps.</i>
examine	Question or examine thoroughly and closely. <i>This forced us to examine every facet of our business.</i>
hear	Examine or hear evidence or a case by judicial process. <i>He did not hear very well.</i>
judge	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of. <i>It is hard to judge whether such opposition is justified.</i>
prove	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>The scheme has proved a great success.</i>
render	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>He would render income tax returns at the end of the year.</i>
sample	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>Bone marrow cells were sampled.</i>
seek	Search for and find someone or something. <i>They came here to seek shelter from biting winter winds.</i>
strain	Separate by passing through a sieve or other straining device to separate out coarser elements. <i>Strain the custard into a bowl.</i>
stress	Put stress on utter with an accent. <i>She was anxious to stress that her daughter s safety was her only concern.</i>
taste	Perceive by the sense of taste. <i>The spinach tastes delicious.</i>
test	Judge or measure someone s proficiency or knowledge by means of a test. <i>The teacher tests us every week.</i>
try on	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of.
try out	Make an effort or attempt.

Analyze (chemical substances).

*I **assayed** a little joke of mine on him.*

attempt

Make an effort or attempt.

*The expedition was the first to **attempt** Everest.*

conscientiously

In a thorough and responsible way.

*A **conscientiously** detailed legislative history.*

contribute

Contribute to some cause.

*He **contributed** articles to the magazine.*

difficult

(of a person) not easy to please or satisfy; awkward.

*A **difficult** child.*

effort

A vigorous or determined attempt.

*He got an A for **effort**.*

endeavor	Attempt by employing effort. <i>Wished him luck in his endeavor.</i>
endeavour	A purposeful or industrious undertaking (especially one that requires effort or boldness). <i>An endeavour to reduce serious injury.</i>
exertion	Use of physical or mental energy; hard work. <i>A well earned rest after their exertions.</i>
<u>impossible</u>	(of a person) very unreasonable. <i>A seemingly impossible task.</i>
impracticable	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved impracticable because of its fragility.</i>
<u>inconceivable</u>	Totally unlikely. <i>They behaved with inconceivable cruelty.</i>
instigation	The verbal act of urging on. <i>The Domesday Survey was compiled at the instigation of William I.</i>
<u>mission</u>	A group of people sent on a mission. <i>A confidential mission to London.</i>
overexertion	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
pains	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
render	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>The estate renders some revenue for the family.</i>
strenuous	Taxing to the utmost; testing powers of endurance- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>Strenuous exercise.</i>
strive	Struggle or fight vigorously. <i>We must strive to secure steady growth.</i>
striving	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
struggling	Engaged in a struggle to overcome especially poverty or obscurity. <i>A struggling actor.</i>
taxing	Physically or mentally demanding. <i>They find the work too taxing.</i>
toil	Exhausting physical labour. <i>A life of toil.</i>
travail	Work hard. <i>A woman in travail.</i>
unacceptable	Not adequate to give satisfaction. <i>A word unacceptable in polite society.</i>

- unbelievable** Not able to be believed; unlikely to be true.
***Unbelievable** or not it happened.*
- unimaginable** Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend.
*Lives of almost **unimaginable** deprivation.*
- unlikely** Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred.
*A butcher is **unlikely** to preach vegetarianism.*
- unthinkable** Incapable of being conceived or considered.
*It was **unthinkable** that John could be dead.*
- workmanlike** Showing efficient competence but not inspiration.
*The book is a **workmanlike** job with chronology and bibliography and index.*
