- *Examine or hear (evidence or a case) by judicial process.*

- *Take a sample of.*
- *Put to the test, as for its quality, or give experimental use to.*
- *Give pain or trouble to.*
- *Melt (fat or lard) in order to separate out impurities.*
- *Test the limits of.*
- *Make an effort or attempt.*
- *Put on a garment in order to see whether it fits and looks nice.*

<u>hear</u>	Examine or hear evidence or a case by judicial process. <i>He did not <b>hear</b> very well.</i>
<u>judge</u>	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of. <i>It is hard to <b>judge</b> whether such opposition is justified.</i>
<b>prove</b>	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>The scheme has <b>proved</b> a great success.</i>
<b>render</b>	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>He would <b>render</b> income tax returns at the end of the year.</i>
<u>sample</u>	Take a sample or samples of something for analysis. <i>Bone marrow cells were <b>sampled</b>.</i>
<b>seek</b>	Search for and find someone or something. <i>They came here to <b>seek</b> shelter from biting winter winds.</i>
<b>strain</b>	Separate by passing through a sieve or other straining device to separate out coarser elements. <i><b>Strain</b> the custard into a bowl.</i>
<b>stress</b>	Put stress on utter with an accent. <i>She was anxious to <b>stress</b> that her daughter s safety was her only concern.</i>
<b>taste</b>	Perceive by the sense of taste. <i>The spinach <b>tastes</b> delicious.</i>
<b>test</b>	Judge or measure someone s proficiency or knowledge by means of a test. <i>The teacher <b>tests</b> us every week.</i>
<b>try on</b>	Put on trial or hear a case and sit as the judge at the trial of.
<b>try out</b>	Make an effort or attempt.

Analyze (chemical substances).

*I **assayed** a little joke of mine on him.*

### **attempt**

Make an effort or attempt.

*The expedition was the first to **attempt** Everest.*

### conscientiously

In a thorough and responsible way.

*A **conscientiously** detailed legislative history.*

### **contribute**

Contribute to some cause.

*He **contributed** articles to the magazine.*

### **difficult**

(of a person) not easy to please or satisfy; awkward.

*A **difficult** child.*

### **effort**

A vigorous or determined attempt.

*He got an A for **effort**.*



<b>endeavor</b>	Attempt by employing effort. <i>Wished him luck in his <b>endeavor</b>.</i>
<b>endeavour</b>	A purposeful or industrious undertaking (especially one that requires effort or boldness). <i>An <b>endeavour</b> to reduce serious injury.</i>
<b>exertion</b>	Use of physical or mental energy; hard work. <i>A well earned rest after their <b>exertions</b>.</i>
<b><u>impossible</u></b>	(of a person) very unreasonable. <i>A seemingly <b>impossible</b> task.</i>
<b>impracticable</b>	Not capable of being carried out or put into practice. <i>Refloating the sunken ship proved <b>impracticable</b> because of its fragility.</i>
<b><u>inconceivable</u></b>	Totally unlikely. <i>They behaved with <b>inconceivable</b> cruelty.</i>
<b>instigation</b>	The verbal act of urging on. <i>The Domesday Survey was compiled at the <b>instigation</b> of William I.</i>
<b><u>mission</u></b>	A group of people sent on a mission. <i>A confidential <b>mission</b> to London.</i>
<b>overexertion</b>	Excessive exertion; so much exertion that discomfort or injury results.
<b>pains</b>	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
<b>render</b>	To surrender someone or something to another. <i>The estate <b>renders</b> some revenue for the family.</i>
<b>strenuous</b>	Taxing to the utmost; testing powers of endurance- F.D.Roosevelt. <i><b>Strenuous</b> exercise.</i>
<b>strive</b>	Struggle or fight vigorously. <i>We must <b>strive</b> to secure steady growth.</i>
<b>striving</b>	An effortful attempt to attain a goal.
<b>struggling</b>	Engaged in a struggle to overcome especially poverty or obscurity. <i>A <b>struggling</b> actor.</i>
<b>taxing</b>	Physically or mentally demanding. <i>They find the work too <b>taxing</b>.</i>
<b>toil</b>	Exhausting physical labour. <i>A life of <b>toil</b>.</i>
<b>travail</b>	Work hard. <i>A woman in <b>travail</b>.</i>
<b>unacceptable</b>	Not adequate to give satisfaction. <i>A word <b>unacceptable</b> in polite society.</i>

- unbelievable** Not able to be believed; unlikely to be true.  
***Unbelievable** or not it happened.*
- unimaginable** Difficult or impossible to imagine or comprehend.  
*Lives of almost **unimaginable** deprivation.*
- unlikely** Not likely to be true or to occur or to have occurred.  
*A butcher is **unlikely** to preach vegetarianism.*
- unthinkable** Incapable of being conceived or considered.  
*It was **unthinkable** that John could be dead.*
- workmanlike** Showing efficient competence but not inspiration.  
*The book is a **workmanlike** job with chronology and bibliography and index.*
