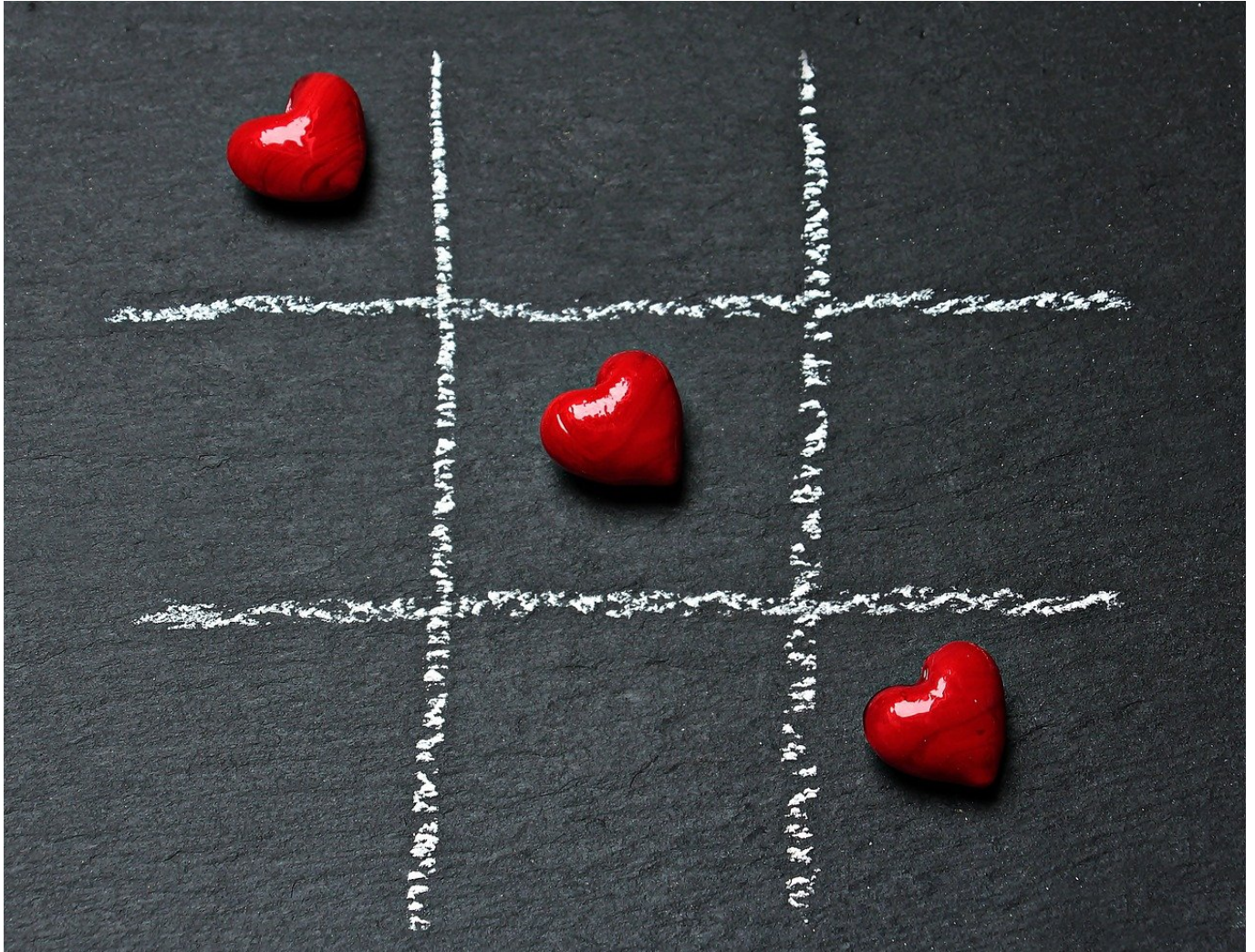

<b>gloat</b>	Gaze at or think about something with great self-satisfaction, gratification, or joy. <i>His enemies <b>gloated</b> over his death.</i>
<b>jubilate</b>	Show great happiness; rejoice. <i>Sing and <b>jubilate</b> aloud before God.</i>
<b>overcome</b>	Overcome usually through no fault or weakness of the person that is overcome. <i>You must <b>overcome</b> all difficulties.</i>
<b>overpower</b>	Defeat or overcome with superior strength. <i>They were <b>overpowered</b> by the fumes.</i>
<b>overwhelm</b>	Be too strong for; overpower. <i>They were <b>overwhelmed</b> by farewell messages.</i>

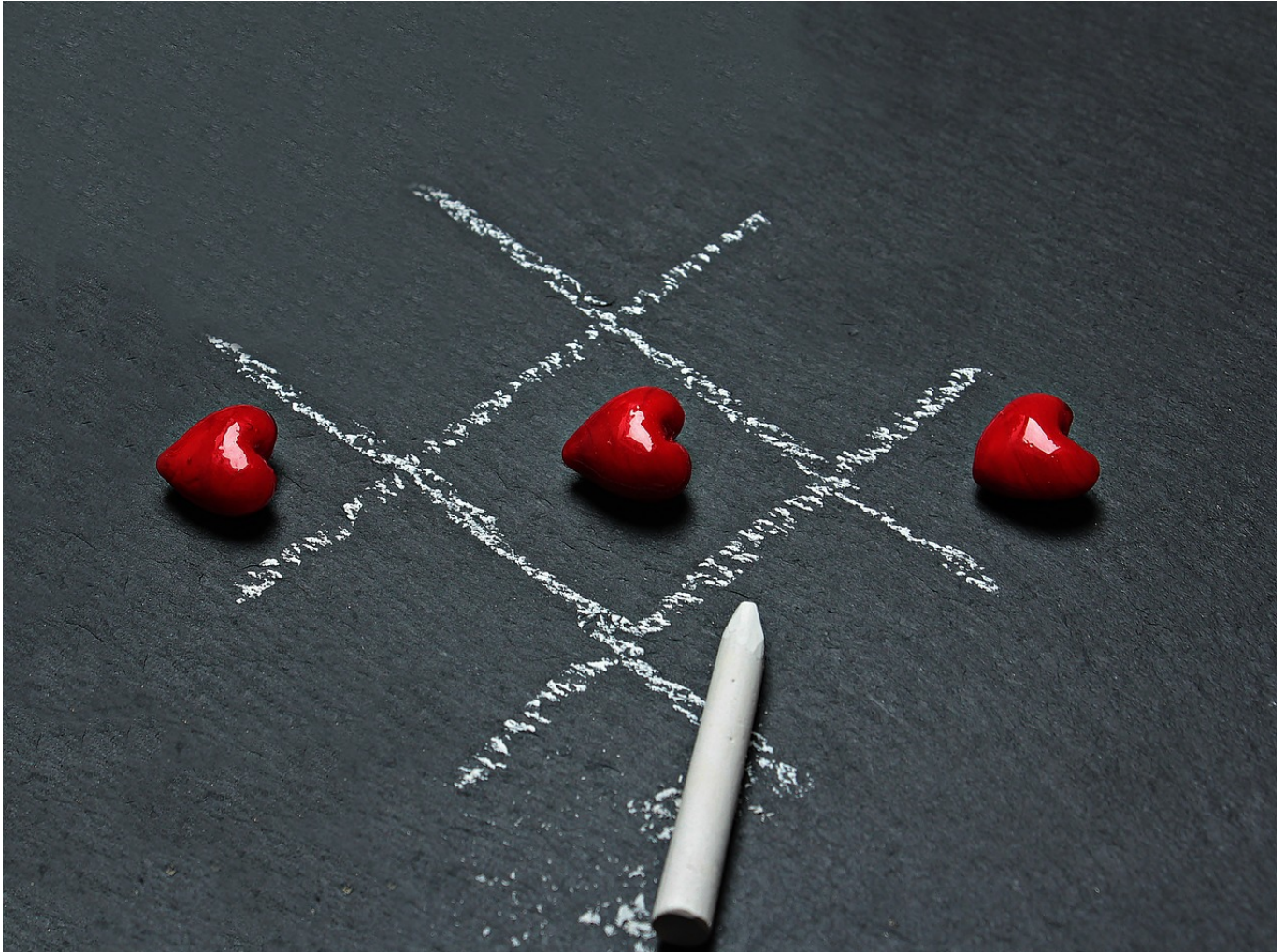
<b>prevail</b>	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance. <i>A friendly atmosphere <b>prevailed</b> among the crowds.</i>
<b>rejoice</b>	Feel happiness or joy. <i>I love to <b>rejoice</b> their poor Hearts at this season.</i>
<b>succeed</b>	Attain fame, wealth, or social status. <i>We <b>succeeded</b> in getting tickets to the show.</i>
<b>swagger</b>	Discourage or frighten with threats or a domineering manner; intimidate. <i>He <b>swaggered</b> along the corridor.</i>
<b>take the crown</b>	Remove something concrete, as by lifting, pushing, or taking off, or remove something abstract.
