<b>jubilant</b>	Full of high-spirited delight. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>prideful</b>	Having an excessively high opinion of oneself. <i>Walked with a <b>prideful</b> swagger.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>A <b>proud</b> name.</i>
<b>rejoicing</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i><b>Rejoicing</b> crowds filled the streets on VJ Day.</i>
<b>successful</b>	Having achieved fame, wealth, or social status. <i>A <b>successful</b> attack on the town.</i>
<b>triumphal</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A vast <b>triumphal</b> arch.</i>
<b>victorious</b>	Experiencing triumph. <i>A <b>victorious</b> army.</i>
<b>winning</b>	Very attractive; capturing interest. <i>A <b>winning</b> personality.</i>

- *He couldn't suppress a triumphant smile.*
- *Two of their triumphant Cup team.*

<b>accomplishment</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable <b>accomplishment</b>.</i>
<b>achieve</b>	To gain with effort. <i>The killings <b>achieved</b> nothing.</i>
<b>achievement</b>	The action of accomplishing something. <i>To reach this stage is a great <b>achievement</b>.</i>
<b>acquire</b>	Learn or develop (a skill, habit, or quality). <i>He <b>acquired</b> a reputation for scrupulous honesty.</i>
<b>acquirement</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The <b>acquirement</b> of self control.</i>

<b>acquisition</b>	The act of contracting or assuming or acquiring possession of something. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of wealth.</i>
<b>attain</b>	Succeed in achieving (something that one has worked for). <i>Dolphins can <b>attain</b> speeds in water which man cannot yet emulate.</i>
<b>attainment</b>	The action or fact of achieving a goal towards which one has worked. <i>The <b>attainment</b> of corporate aims.</i>
<b>blowout</b>	An easy victory. <i>You can't do a <b>blowout</b> with super wet hair.</i>
<b>clinch</b>	Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. <i>Breaking from a <b>clinch</b> he crossed with his right.</i>
<b>competition</b>	Interaction between animal or plant species, or individual organisms, that are attempting to gain a share of a limited environmental resource. <i>He wanted to know what the <b>competition</b> was doing.</i>
<b>delighted</b>	Greatly pleased. <i>We were <b>delighted</b> to see her.</i>
<b>elated</b>	Exultantly proud and joyful; in high spirits. <i>After the concert I felt <b>elated</b>.</i>
<b>exult</b>	To express great joy. <i>Who cannot <b>exult</b> in Spring.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>exultation</b>	A feeling of triumphant elation or jubilation; rejoicing. <i>She laughs in <b>exultation</b>.</i>
<b>feat</b>	A notable achievement. <i>The new printing presses were considerable <b>feats</b> of engineering.</i>
<b>gain</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>She <b>gained</b> 20 pounds when she stopped exercising.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Having a sense of trust and confidence in (a person, arrangement, or situation). <i>I can't say they looked too <b>happy</b> about it but a deal's a deal.</i>
<b>joyful</b>	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i><b>Joyful</b> music.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>

<b>jubilation</b>	A feeling of extreme joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of <b>jubilation</b>.</i>
<b>rejoice</b>	Used ironically to draw attention to a strange characteristic, especially a name. <i>The guard <b>rejoiced</b> in the name of Blossom.</i>
<b>rejoicing</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i><b>Rejoicing</b> crowds filled the streets on VJ Day.</i>
<b>succeed</b>	Take over a throne, office, or other position from. <i>The management and business skills you need to <b>succeed</b>.</i>
<b>success</b>	An attainment that is successful. <i>Overall the fair was a great <b>success</b>.</i>
<b>triumph</b>	A successful ending of a struggle or contest. <i>The agreement was a <b>triumph</b> for common sense.</i>
<b>victory</b>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>A narrow <b>victory</b>.</i>
<b>win</b>	Be the winner in a contest or competition be victorious. <i>You will find it difficult to <b>win</b> back their attention.</i>
<b>winner</b>	A person or thing that wins something. <i>Anyone taking out a fixed rate mortgage could be on to a <b>winner</b>.</i>
