## Synonyms of "Trivia" as a noun (11 Words)

<b>details</b>	An isolated fact that is considered separately from the whole. <i>After the trial he gave us the real <b>details</b>.</i>
<b>irrelevancies</b>	The lack of a relation of something to the matter at hand.
<b>minutiae</b>	The small, precise, or trivial details of something. <i>The <b>minutiae</b> of everyday life.</i>
<b>niceties</b>	A subtle difference in meaning or opinion or attitude.
<b>petty details</b>	Larceny of property having a value less than some amount (the amount varies by locale).
<b>small beer</b>	The slender part of the back.
<b>technicalities</b>	A specific detail in a set of rules or terms belonging to a particular field. <i>The resolution died on a <b>technicality</b>.</i>
<b>trifle</b>	A detail that is considered insignificant. <i>The thousand yen he d paid seemed the merest <b>trifle</b>.</i>

<b>trifles</b>	A cold pudding made of layers of sponge cake spread with fruit or jelly; may be decorated with nuts, cream, or chocolate.
<b>trivialities</b>	The quality of being unimportant and petty or frivolous.
<b>triviality</b>	Lack of seriousness or importance; insignificance. <i>The relentlessness of his <b>triviality</b> is grating.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Trivia" as a noun

## Associations of "Trivia" (30 Words)

<b>abstruse</b>	Difficult to understand; obscure. <i>The professor's lectures were so <b>abstruse</b> that students tended to avoid them.</i>
<b>arcane</b>	Requiring secret or mysterious knowledge. <i>The <b>arcane</b> science of dowsing.</i>
<b>blur</b>	Make unclear indistinct or blurred. <i>The day before was a <b>blur</b>.</i>
<b>bootless</b>	(of a task or undertaking) ineffectual; useless. <i>Remonstrating with him seems ever to have been a <b>bootless</b> task.</i>
<b>concealed</b>	Not accessible to view. <i>A <b>concealed</b> compartment in his briefcase.</i>
<b>cryptogram</b>	A text written in code.

<b>darkness</b>	Night. <i>Moments of <b>darkness</b> were rare.</i>
<b><u>enigma</u></b>	Something that baffles understanding and cannot be explained. <i>Madeleine was still an <b>enigma</b> to him.</i>
<b>enigmatic</b>	Resembling an oracle in obscurity of thought. <i>He took the money with an <b>enigmatic</b> smile.</i>
<b>esoteric</b>	Confined to and understandable by only an enlightened inner circle. <i><b>Esoteric</b> philosophical debates.</i>
<b>esoterica</b>	Esoteric or highly specialized subjects or publications. <i>A professor of such <b>esoterica</b> as angelology and comparative shamanism.</i>
<b><u>futile</u></b>	Producing no result or effect. <i>A <b>futile</b> attempt to keep fans from mounting the stage.</i>
<b><u>inconspicuous</u></b>	Not prominent or readily noticeable. <i>He pushed the string through an <b>inconspicuous</b> hole.</i>
<b><u>ineffectual</u></b>	(of a person) lacking the ability or qualities to fulfil a role or handle a situation. <i>An <b>ineffectual</b> ruler.</i>
<b><u>minority</u></b>	The state or period of being under the age of full legal responsibility. <i>He held a <b>minority</b> position.</i>
<b>nugatory</b>	Useless or futile. <i>The teacher shortages will render <b>nugatory</b> the hopes of implementing the new curriculum.</i>
<b><u>obscure</u></b>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>An <b>obscure</b> flaw.</i>
<b><u>puzzle</u></b>	A jigsaw puzzle. <i>Those who solve this <b>puzzle</b> in the shortest time are eligible for awards.</i>
<b><u>puzzling</u></b>	Not clear to the understanding. <i>A <b>puzzling</b> statement.</i>
<b>recondite</b>	(of a subject or knowledge) little known; abstruse. <i>Some <b>recondite</b> problem in historiography.</i>
<b>secret</b>	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>The resupply effort was probably kept <b>secret</b> from Congress.</i>
<b><u>secretive</u></b>	(of a state or activity) characterized by the concealment of intentions and information. <i><b>Secretive</b> deals.</i>
<b><u>trivial</u></b>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Huge fines were imposed for <b>trivial</b> offences.</i>

<b>unavailing</b>	Achieving little or nothing; ineffective. <i>An <b>unavailing</b> attempt.</i>
<b><u>unclear</u></b>	Not clear to the mind. <i>The law itself was <b>unclear</b> on that point.</i>
<b><u>unnoticeable</u></b>	Not easily observed or noticed. <i>An <b>unnoticeable</b> cigarette burn on the carpet.</i>
<b>unsung</b>	Not famous or acclaimed. <i><b>Unsung</b> heroes of the war.</i>
<b><u>useless</u></b>	Not fulfilling or not expected to achieve the intended purpose or desired outcome. <i>A kitchen full of <b>useless</b> gadgets.</i>
<b>vain</b>	Unproductive of success. <i><b>Vain</b> about her clothes.</i>
<b>valueless</b>	Of no value. <i>Cherished but <b>valueless</b> heirlooms.</i>
