Synonyms of "Trivia" as a noun (11 Words)

details	An isolated fact that is considered separately from the whole. <i>After the trial he gave us the real details.</i>
irrelevancies	The lack of a relation of something to the matter at hand.
minutiae	The small, precise, or trivial details of something. <i>The minutiae of everyday life.</i>
niceties	A subtle difference in meaning or opinion or attitude.
petty details	Larceny of property having a value less than some amount (the amount varies by locale).
small beer	The slender part of the back.
technicalities	A specific detail in a set of rules or terms belonging to a particular field. <i>The resolution died on a technicality.</i>
trifle	A detail that is considered insignificant. <i>The thousand yen he d paid seemed the merest trifle.</i>

trifles	A cold pudding made of layers of sponge cake spread with fruit or jelly; may be decorated with nuts, cream, or chocolate.
trivialities	The quality of being unimportant and petty or frivolous.
triviality	Lack of seriousness or importance; insignificance. <i>The relentlessness of his triviality is grating.</i>

Associations of "Trivia" (30 Words)

abstruse	Difficult to understand; obscure. <i>The professor's lectures were so abstruse that students tended to avoid them.</i>
arcane	Requiring secret or mysterious knowledge. <i>The arcane science of dowsing.</i>
blur	Make unclear, indistinct, or blurred. <i>The day before was a blur.</i>
bootless	(of a task or undertaking) ineffectual; useless. <i>Remonstrating with him seems ever to have been a bootless task.</i>
concealed	Not accessible to view. <i>A concealed compartment in his briefcase.</i>
cryptogram	A text written in code.

darkness	Night. <i>Moments of darkness were rare.</i>
<u>enigma</u>	Something that baffles understanding and cannot be explained. <i>Madeleine was still an enigma to him.</i>
enigmatic	Resembling an oracle in obscurity of thought. <i>He took the money with an enigmatic smile.</i>
esoteric	Confined to and understandable by only an enlightened inner circle. <i>Esoteric philosophical debates.</i>
esoterica	Esoteric or highly specialized subjects or publications. <i>A professor of such esoterica as angelology and comparative shamanism.</i>
<u>futile</u>	Producing no result or effect. <i>A futile attempt to keep fans from mounting the stage.</i>
<u>inconspicuous</u>	Not prominent or readily noticeable. <i>He pushed the string through an inconspicuous hole.</i>
<u>ineffectual</u>	(of a person) lacking the ability or qualities to fulfil a role or handle a situation. <i>An ineffectual ruler.</i>
<u>minority</u>	The state or period of being under the age of full legal responsibility. <i>He held a minority position.</i>
nugatory	Useless or futile. <i>The teacher shortages will render nugatory the hopes of implementing the new curriculum.</i>
<u>obscure</u>	Make obscure or unclear. <i>An obscure flaw.</i>
<u>puzzle</u>	A jigsaw puzzle. <i>Those who solve this puzzle in the shortest time are eligible for awards.</i>
<u>puzzling</u>	Not clear to the understanding. <i>A puzzling statement.</i>
recondite	(of a subject or knowledge) little known; abstruse. <i>Some recondite problem in historiography.</i>
secret	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>The resupply effort was probably kept secret from Congress.</i>
<u>secretive</u>	(of a state or activity) characterized by the concealment of intentions and information. <i>Secretive deals.</i>
<u>trivial</u>	Concerned with trivialities. <i>Huge fines were imposed for trivial offences.</i>

unavailing	Achieving little or nothing; ineffective. <i>An unavailing attempt.</i>
<u>unclear</u>	Not clear to the mind. <i>The law itself was unclear on that point.</i>
<u>unnoticeable</u>	Not easily observed or noticed. <i>An unnoticeable cigarette burn on the carpet.</i>
unsung	Not famous or acclaimed. <i>Unsung heroes of the war.</i>
<u>useless</u>	Not fulfilling or not expected to achieve the intended purpose or desired outcome. <i>A kitchen full of useless gadgets.</i>
vain	Unproductive of success. <i>Vain about her clothes.</i>
valueless	Of no value. <i>Cherished but valueless heirlooms.</i>
