Definitions of "Trolling" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “trolling” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A partsong in which voices follow each other; one voice starts and others join in one after another until all are singing different parts of the song at the same time.*
- *A supernatural creature (either a dwarf or a giant) that is supposed to live in caves or in the mountains.*
- *A fisherman's lure that is used in trolling.*
- *Angling by drawing a baited line through the water.*

- brute** A cruelly rapacious person.
*The **brute** necessities of basic subsistence.*
- buffoon** A person who amuses others by ridiculous behavior.
- chimpanzee** Intelligent somewhat arboreal ape of equatorial African forests.
- colossal** (of an order) having more than one storey of columns.
***Colossal** crumbling ruins of an ancient temple.*
- colossus** Someone or something that is abnormally large and powerful.
*The Russian Empire was the **colossus** of European politics.*
- demon** Something very insidious and harmful.
*His eyes are bursting with pure **demon**.*

devil	(Judeo-Christian and Islamic religions) chief spirit of evil and adversary of God; tempter of mankind; master of Hell. <i>The work of the devil.</i>
dragon	A mythical monster like a giant reptile In European tradition the dragon is typically fire breathing and tends to symbolize chaos or evil whereas in East Asia it is usually a beneficent symbol of fertility associated with water and the heavens. <i>The geography teacher was a real dragon.</i>
dwarf	A person who is of unusually or abnormally small stature because of a congenital condition a person affected by dwarfism. <i>The insurance industry is still battling with a number of challenges that have dwarfed its growth.</i>
elephantine	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>There was an elephantine thud from the bathroom.</i>
enormous	Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree. <i>Enormous sums of money.</i>
fairy	Offensive term for a homosexual man. <i>Fairy gold.</i>
fiend	An evil spirit or demon. <i>A football fiend.</i>
gargantuan	Enormous. <i>A gargantuan appetite.</i>
giant	Used in names of very large animals and plants e.g. giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>Walton built a retail giant.</i>
gigantic	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A gigantic concrete tower.</i>
gnome	A small ugly person. <i>A grizzled gnome of a man.</i>
hydra	A long faint constellation in the southern hemisphere near the equator stretching between Virgo and Cancer. <i>We may be facing a hydra that defies any easy solution.</i>
imp	A small, mischievous devil or sprite. <i>A cheeky young imp.</i>
leviathan	(in biblical use) a sea monster, identified in different passages with the whale and the crocodile (e.g. Job 41, Ps. 74:14), and with the Devil (after Isa. 27:1). <i>The great leviathans of the deep.</i>

mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth multinational corporation.</i>
massive	Imposing in scale or scope or degree or power. <i>The band are going to be massive.</i>
monster	An inhumanly cruel or wicked person. <i>My mum used to monster me for coming home so late.</i>
ogre	A cruel wicked and inhuman person. <i>It is clear that I am no ogre.</i>
pygmy	Used in names of animals and plants that are much smaller than more typical kinds e g pygmy shrew pygmy water lily. <i>Charles VIII of France was a pygmy.</i>
rapscallion	One who is playfully mischievous. <i>They were the rapscallions behind this practical joke.</i>
scamp	A person, especially a child, who is mischievous in a likeable or amusing way. <i>That man was a scamp a damn thief.</i>
serpent	A firework that moves in serpentine manner when ignited. <i>Fire breathing flying serpents.</i>
sylph	An imaginary spirit of the air. <i>An oh so slim sylph dressed in a black leotard.</i>
