imp A small, mischievous devil or sprite.

A cheeky young **imp**.

(in biblical use) a sea monster, identified in different passages with the whale

**leviathan** and the crocodile (e.g. Job 41, Ps. 74:14), and with the Devil (after Isa. 27:1).

The great **leviathans** of the deep.



mammoth So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth.

A mammoth multinational corporation.

Imposing in scale or scope or degree or power.

The band are going to be **massive**.

monster An inhumanly cruel or wicked person.

My mum used to **monster** me for coming home so late.

ogre A cruel wicked and inhuman person.

It is clear that I am no **ogre**.

Used in names of animals and plants that are much smaller than more typical

**pygmy** kinds e g pygmy shrew pygmy water lily.

Charles VIII of France was a pygmy.

One who is playfully mischievous.

They were the **rapscallion**s behind this practical joke.

**scamp** A person, especially a child, who is mischievous in a likeable or amusing way.

That man was a **scamp** a damn thief.

**serpent** A firework that moves in serpentine manner when ignited.

Fire breathing flying **serpent**s.

sylph An imaginary spirit of the air.

An oh so slim **sylph** dressed in a black leotard.
