<b><u>behemoth</u></b>	Something enormous, especially a large and powerful organization. <i>Shoppers are now more loyal to their local shops than to faceless <b>behemoths</b>.</i>
<b>brute</b>	A cruelly rapacious person. <i>The <b>brute</b> necessities of basic subsistence.</i>
<b>buffoon</b>	A person who amuses others by ridiculous behavior.
<b>chimpanzee</b>	Intelligent somewhat arboreal ape of equatorial African forests.
<b>colossal</b>	(of an order) having more than one storey of columns. <i><b>Colossal</b> crumbling ruins of an ancient temple.</i>
<b>colossus</b>	Someone or something that is abnormally large and powerful. <i>The Russian Empire was the <b>colossus</b> of European politics.</i>
<b><u>demon</u></b>	Something very insidious and harmful. <i>His eyes are bursting with pure <b>demon</b>.</i>

<b>devil</b>	(Judeo-Christian and Islamic religions) chief spirit of evil and adversary of God; tempter of mankind; master of Hell. <i>The work of the <b>devil</b>.</i>
<b>dragon</b>	A mythical monster like a giant reptile In European tradition the dragon is typically fire breathing and tends to symbolize chaos or evil whereas in East Asia it is usually a beneficent symbol of fertility associated with water and the heavens. <i>The geography teacher was a real <b>dragon</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>dwarf</u></a>	A person who is of unusually or abnormally small stature because of a congenital condition a person affected by dwarfism. <i>The insurance industry is still battling with a number of challenges that have <b>dwarfed</b> its growth.</i>
<b>elephantine</b>	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>There was an <b>elephantine</b> thud from the bathroom.</i>
<b>enormous</b>	Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree. <i><b>Enormous</b> sums of money.</i>
<b>fairy</b>	Offensive term for a homosexual man. <i><b>Fairy</b> gold.</i>
<b>fiend</b>	An evil spirit or demon. <i>A football <b>fiend</b>.</i>
<b>gargantuan</b>	Enormous. <i>A <b>gargantuan</b> appetite.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>Walton built a retail <b>giant</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>gigantic</u></a>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A <b>gigantic</b> concrete tower.</i>
<b>gnome</b>	A small ugly person. <i>A grizzled <b>gnome</b> of a man.</i>
<b>hydra</b>	A long faint constellation in the southern hemisphere near the equator stretching between Virgo and Cancer. <i>We may be facing a <b>hydra</b> that defies any easy solution.</i>
<b>imp</b>	A small, mischievous devil or sprite. <i>A cheeky young <b>imp</b>.</i>
<b>leviathan</b>	(in biblical use) a sea monster, identified in different passages with the whale and the crocodile (e.g. Job 41, Ps. 74:14), and with the Devil (after Isa. 27:1). <i>The great <b>leviathans</b> of the deep.</i>

<b>mammoth</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A <b>mammoth</b> multinational corporation.</i>
<b>massive</b>	Imposing in scale or scope or degree or power. <i>The band are going to be <b>massive</b>.</i>
<b>monster</b>	An inhumanly cruel or wicked person. <i>My mum used to <b>monster</b> me for coming home so late.</i>
<b>ogre</b>	A cruel wicked and inhuman person. <i>It is clear that I am no <b>ogre</b>.</i>
<b>pygmy</b>	Used in names of animals and plants that are much smaller than more typical kinds e g pygmy shrew pygmy water lily. <i>Charles VIII of France was a <b>pygmy</b>.</i>
<b>rapscallion</b>	One who is playfully mischievous. <i>They were the <b>rapscallions</b> behind this practical joke.</i>
<b>scamp</b>	A person, especially a child, who is mischievous in a likeable or amusing way. <i>That man was a <b>scamp</b> a damn thief.</i>
<b>serpent</b>	A firework that moves in serpentine manner when ignited. <i>Fire breathing flying <b>serpents</b>.</i>
<b>sylph</b>	An imaginary spirit of the air. <i>An oh so slim <b>sylph</b> dressed in a black leotard.</i>
