- army** The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare.
Army officers.
- band** Put a band on a bird for identification.
*He noted that she wore a wedding **band**.*
- bastion** A natural rock formation resembling a man made bastion.
*A **bastion** against corruption.*
- battalion** A large body of troops ready for battle, especially an infantry unit forming part of a brigade.
*A **battalion** of ants.*
- brigade** Form into a brigade.
*The militia which was **brigaded** with regular formations to improve its training.*
- cantonment** A military garrison or camp.

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| <u>castle</u> | (chess) the piece that can move any number of unoccupied squares in a direction parallel to the sides of the chessboard. <i>Both of the players castled on the queenside.</i> |
| centurion | The commander of a century in the ancient Roman army. |
| command | The power or authority to command. <i>The fortress commands the shortest Channel crossing.</i> |
| <u>commander</u> | A rank of naval officer above lieutenant commander and below captain. <i>The commander of a paratroop regiment.</i> |
| <u>contingent</u> | (of losses, liabilities, etc.) that can be anticipated to arise if a particular event occurs. <i>His fees were contingent on the success of his search.</i> |
| deployment | The distribution of forces in preparation for battle or work. <i>The authorities announced deployment of extra security forces in towns and cities to prevent violence.</i> |
| <u>fort</u> | Gather in or as if in a fort as for protection or defense. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of forts.</i> |
| <u>fortress</u> | A person or thing not susceptible to outside influence or disturbance. <i>He had proved himself to be a fortress of moral rectitude.</i> |
| <u>frontier</u> | The extreme limit of understanding or achievement in a particular area. <i>International crime knows no frontiers.</i> |
| garrison | The building occupied by a garrison. <i>Air reconnaissance showed the Germans had not garrisoned the island.</i> |
| grenadier | An infantryman equipped with grenades. |
| <u>legion</u> | Archaic terms for army. <i>Palomar s fans are legion.</i> |
| legionary | A soldier who is a member of a legion (especially the French Foreign Legion). <i>The legionary fortress of Isca.</i> |
| lombard | A member of a Germanic people who invaded northern Italy in the 6th century. |
| <u>mobilize</u> | Organize and encourage (a group of people) to take collective action in pursuit of a particular objective. <i>It would be hard for worker representatives to mobilize the workforce against the employers.</i> |
| <u>morale</u> | The confidence, enthusiasm, and discipline of a person or group at a particular time. <i>The team s morale was high.</i> |

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| recapture | Capture (a person or animal that has escaped). <i>Armed police have recaptured a prisoner who s been on the run for five days.</i> |
| regiment | Assign to a regiment. <i>The whole regiment of women MPs.</i> |
| reinforcement | Information that makes more forcible or convincing. <i>Older electricity mains required reinforcement to meet increased demand.</i> |
| sally | A military action in which besieged troops burst forth from their position. <i>There was subdued laughter at this sally.</i> |
| soldier | Serve as a soldier. <i>I soldiered with your father on his last four campaigns.</i> |
| sortie | (military) an operational flight by a single aircraft (as in a military operation). <i>An early morning sortie into the garden of our hotel.</i> |
| squad | A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>Ireland s World Cup squad.</i> |
| summon | Authoritatively call on (someone) to be present as a defendant or witness in a law court. <i>He summoned a meeting of head delegates.</i> |
