- army** The army of the United States of America the agency that organizes and trains soldiers for land warfare.  
*Army officers.*
- band** Put a band on a bird for identification.  
*He noted that she wore a wedding **band**.*
- bastion** A natural rock formation resembling a man made bastion.  
*A **bastion** against corruption.*
- battalion** A large body of troops ready for battle, especially an infantry unit forming part of a brigade.  
*A **battalion** of ants.*
- brigade** Form into a brigade.  
*The militia which was **brigaded** with regular formations to improve its training.*
- cantonment** A military garrison or camp.

<b><u>castle</u></b>	(chess) the piece that can move any number of unoccupied squares in a direction parallel to the sides of the chessboard. <i>Both of the players <b>castled</b> on the queenside.</i>
<b>centurion</b>	The commander of a century in the ancient Roman army.
<b>command</b>	The power or authority to command. <i>The fortress <b>commands</b> the shortest Channel crossing.</i>
<b><u>commander</u></b>	A rank of naval officer above lieutenant commander and below captain. <i>The <b>commander</b> of a paratroop regiment.</i>
<b><u>contingent</u></b>	(of losses, liabilities, etc.) that can be anticipated to arise if a particular event occurs. <i>His fees were <b>contingent</b> on the success of his search.</i>
<b>deployment</b>	The distribution of forces in preparation for battle or work. <i>The authorities announced <b>deployment</b> of extra security forces in towns and cities to prevent violence.</i>
<b><u>fort</u></b>	Gather in or as if in a fort as for protection or defense. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of <b>forts</b>.</i>
<b><u>fortress</u></b>	A person or thing not susceptible to outside influence or disturbance. <i>He had proved himself to be a <b>fortress</b> of moral rectitude.</i>
<b><u>frontier</u></b>	The extreme limit of understanding or achievement in a particular area. <i>International crime knows no <b>frontiers</b>.</i>
<b>garrison</b>	The building occupied by a garrison. <i>Air reconnaissance showed the Germans had not <b>garrisoned</b> the island.</i>
<b>grenadier</b>	An infantryman equipped with grenades.
<b><u>legion</u></b>	Archaic terms for army. <i>Palomar s fans are <b>legion</b>.</i>
<b>legionary</b>	A soldier who is a member of a legion (especially the French Foreign Legion). <i>The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.</i>
<b>lombard</b>	A member of a Germanic people who invaded northern Italy in the 6th century.
<b><u>mobilize</u></b>	Organize and encourage (a group of people) to take collective action in pursuit of a particular objective. <i>It would be hard for worker representatives to <b>mobilize</b> the workforce against the employers.</i>
<b><u>morale</u></b>	The confidence, enthusiasm, and discipline of a person or group at a particular time. <i>The team s <b>morale</b> was high.</i>

<b>recapture</b>	Capture (a person or animal that has escaped). <i>Armed police have <b>recaptured</b> a prisoner who s been on the run for five days.</i>
<b>regiment</b>	Assign to a regiment. <i>The whole <b>regiment</b> of women MPs.</i>
<b>reinforcement</b>	Information that makes more forcible or convincing. <i>Older electricity mains required <b>reinforcement</b> to meet increased demand.</i>
<b>sally</b>	A military action in which besieged troops burst forth from their position. <i>There was subdued laughter at this <b>sally</b>.</i>
<b>soldier</b>	Serve as a soldier. <i>I <b>soldiered</b> with your father on his last four campaigns.</i>
<b>sortie</b>	(military) an operational flight by a single aircraft (as in a military operation). <i>An early morning <b>sortie</b> into the garden of our hotel.</i>
<b>squad</b>	A small squad of policemen trained to deal with a particular kind of crime. <i>Ireland s World Cup <b>squad</b>.</i>
<b>summon</b>	Authoritatively call on (someone) to be present as a defendant or witness in a law court. <i>He <b>summoned</b> a meeting of head delegates.</i>
